MR. WELLENS: Good evening, I'm Eric Wellens. I am the proud owner of the digital billboard that's up on 30th and to help further economic development of the Town ---

MR. WELLENS: How is that?

MALE SPEAKER: It's better.

MR. WELLENS: Okay, thank you. So, yes, I'm Eric Wellens, I own the property at the entrance to the community on 30th that has the digital billboard on it. We've been working hard to promote the Town there and, you know, I see additional needs for the Town to help develop some of the commercial aspects to -- and make it, you know, sort of a spark to promote others. So, identified the lot, the former HUD lot, on 31st and we, you know, we initially had Council review, we've since had HUD review approval, the Town's Council has reviewed and

1	revised, and we've agreed to the changes and
2	the key is, you know, hopefully to spark others
3	to come, right? So, my idea is, first, to give
4	the Town first choice, right? So, if they need
5	administrative offices, Councilmen offices, if
6	I've been pushing hard Ben, can share
7	with you I've been trying to get a museum
8	brought in here. We would have space available
9	for that, and it would be offered at, you know,
10	submarket rate which I'm sure this would Mr.
11	Quattlebaum about it. The land the key to
12	it is the land remains the Town's, that's the
13	way HUD required and that's the way it would
14	be, we would just be putting a structure on it.
15	At the conclusion of the lease, the building
16	was agreed it would be donated to the Town.
17	Officially, the summary, I'm looking to get
18	commercial operations in here that we don't
19	have yet so a doctor's office, a physical
20	therapist's office, a dentist's office, a
21	lawyer's office, some professional offices like
22	that what I'd really love to bring in is a
23	healthy food option. I'm a plant-based type
24	eater so I'd love to bring in a restaurant that
25	would do something along those lines. I've

already had excuse me I've already had
many conversations with interested parties but
I can't go into details with that until final
approval is done. So, they're all lined up
just waiting for me to say it's good to go,
there's a lot of interest and I think it would
really be the spark that might really help, you
know, sort of the curb appeal going down 17,
something new and fresh to spark others around
it to do some development. I'm open to any
questions you might have. I shared with Ben
some estimates on possible revenues to the
Town, there's multiple levels of type of
revenue that would come in from, you know,
business license taxes, some of the businesses,
the renter taxes, we even have things like
hospitality taxes, personal property taxes that
the businesses have, all of the taxes would be,
you know, in accordance to the Town Ordinance.

MAYOR EVANS: I -- what I'm ---

I mean negotiate some of the revenue

Town has for several years entered into a
technical assistance agreement with the
Waccamaw COG to provide planning and zoning
technical assistance to the Town of Atlantic
Beach, and those scope of services will involve
in terms of providing TA to our Planning and
Board of Zoning Appeals, as well as, review of
development plans and proposals for the Town of
Atlantic Beach. The contract amount is \$20,000
running to June 30th, 2023 and will be billed
at an hourly rate of \$120 per hour until that
is exhausted. If we exceed that amount, they
will bill us on a quarterly basis at \$120 an
hour. I'm recommending our former Planning
Representative, Carol Coleman, left the
Waccamaw COG about three to four weeks ago and
the COG has hired a replacement for her in that
capacity that will be our liaison and the
technical assistant provided to the Town of
Atlantic Beach. Her name is Leigh Kane and she
just started working for the COG on last
Monday. So, I'm seeking the Council to approve
this agreement to have continuity of services
from the COG.

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: --- before Ms. Smith comes forward, Council had approved in 2022 for this event to take place in August, the details of which proposal you have, had to be canceled this year. Ms. Smith will speak to that and request that we -- to hold the event in August of 2023. Ms. Smith?

MS. SMITH: Good evening, everyone.

IN UNISON: Good evening.

MS. SMITH: I also -- I want to say good evening to the community as well. Let me start by saying for one, I did cancel the festival for 2022, I was in the hospital with -- they said about every symptom you can have for COVID -- and I thought it was best to keep everyone safe, not have it and hopefully have it granted for next year. Secondly, I want to continue along by saying that everything that I do -- and I speak to the community -- I do for the community. A lot of you don't know me, you probably have

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never seen me before, some of you have, some of I have talked before. I was executive producer here over 35 years ago, writing stories on Atlantic Beach and the surrounding areas. I was one of the producers that actually used to cover --- but that's in a biblical term -- cover Atlantic Beach when wanted to write other producers stories, wanted to cover you and not show you in the light that other producers wanted to display Atlantic Beach. The festival in 2021 was, from my feedback, extremely successful, a lot of people enjoyed it, they understood the mission Melba Moore was here and others, behind it. got uр on а stage and she made she an announcement that it necessary for was community to come together. I did not know at the time that she was gonna call me up on stage at the same time (inaudible) I didn't know that she was gonna call me up on stage with her to that plea to the community make to work So everything I do, I together. do with community in mind. This year's festival, or 2023, we sent out announcements to every HBCU in the United States, along with vocational

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universities, career programs. The surprising
thing and the delightful thing was that on
August 19th, there were universities on
Atlantic Beach, ready to give the youth here
opportunities, that's all we were trying to do
was to give opportunities to the youth that
were here, and it doesn't necessarily mean
youth as in, you know, 16, 17, 18, I feel older
people also want to graduate and go to college
as well. I did one of my last graduate
programs at 50. So, you always want to learn,
you always want to grow and that's what that
was about. I want to highlight that I first
came to Atlantic Beach and wanted to give you
all the resources that I had available under my
umbrella working at United Nations, that was
not able to happen and so we opened a school
like two blocks up the street whereas I wanted
to give that money to you, but I'm now giving
it to someone else, where I wanted to hand it
to you. We have a shelter, that money is going
somewhere else outside the community, once
again, I wanted to give that to what I consider
my community so but we do have a school,
we've hired 13 apprentices that have come on

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board. I pay them out of my own pocket so if
I can't do it in one way, I'll get it done in
another so if I have to hire and bring them in
and pay them myself, that's what I'll do. So
we've hired 13 apprentices here in the county,
outside of the county, but they all look like
you and I so (inaudible). But so what I
also wanted to note was that the universities
if I went and I appealed to 50 to 60
universities, if I was able to have maybe four
to five to six universities come in to the
festival to bring college opportunities and
career opportunities to the youth in this
county, if I if I had four or five that said
yes, I was happy. I made a plea to 20 to 30,
but the fact that two or three still came here
even with the festival canceled, Council, they
still came which meant that they supported
they support the festival, they want to come
here, they want to give opportunities to the
youth here, they want to give career
opportunities to the youth here, they left bags
full of memorabilia for me to give to the
community here because they're ready for next
year's festival. It was nice that the ones

that did come, it was nice that they came
because they had a chance to the see the area
where the festival would be so that was good
and then we had a chance to talk one on one.
I think that's about all that I have. I did
want to note that the times from the schools
participating, from the vendors that might be
here, Mr. Quattlebaum and the City had an
approval to have just a designated amount of
vendors, it was like three or four but it
wasn't many, and then the schools, a percentage
of that was going to the City of Atlantic
Beach. There was memorabilia that was
developed and designed, I paid for those
designs so that we could give a percentage of
that back to the City as well. That's all I
have.

19	October 2022 grant report. Over the last					
20	several months, I, along with Volunteer Evans,					
21	have reviewed and responded to three categories					
22	of grant funding to move the Town's initiative					
23	forward. These funding categories are the					
24	historical grant opportunities, Atlantic Beach					
25	has been awarded three different historical					

1	grants: Economic development opportunities, in
2	August, a grant request submission was made to
3	with the Santee Cooper Rural Economic
4	Development Fund and economic development work.
5	Three infrastructure improvement and updating
6	and grant opportunities during August,
7	submission was made to Horry County, American
8	Rescue Plan Act Community Development Block
9	Grant for infrastructure improvements, work
10	that we're also informed that Atlantic Beach
11	did not one of the projects funded under the
12	Department of Transportation RAISE Grant, we
13	did not receive the funding that we applied for
14	under the RAISE Grant. Tonight's report will
15	highlight the work on three of the historical
16	grants awarded to the Town. Historical grants,
17	Atlantic Beach has been awarded three
18	historical grants this year. Historical grant
19	award number one, Telling the Full Story
20	awarded in March 2022 by the National Historic
21	Trust and the last oral harvest will be held on
22	Telling the Full Story Grant Team is in the
23	second quarter of the first one-year
24	performance period. This quarter, the team
25	will be in person in this community center here

on October the 22nd from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00
p.m., contact Patricia Mallett, Rosa Rucker for
details on how you can participate. And these
are interviews that the committee has been
holding with residents of the Town to capture
the history and documents, some of the history
of the Town through firsthand recollection of
residents and other community people who have
resided in the Town of Atlantic Beach. Number
two, historical grant award two,
Underrepresented Communities Grant awarded in
April of 2022. Horry County on behalf of
Atlantic Beach by the National Park Service,
due to contractual issues within Horry County,
the town survey has been postponed, you will be
updated once the survey date has been set.
Historical grant number three, Broadening the
Narrative Grant awarded July 22nd by the
Dorothy Gaylord Donnelley Foundation. The
Broadening of the Narrative Grant is a planning
grant, funds from this grant are designed for
planning, collection and display of the
historical artifacts of the Town of Atlantic
Beach. The Town received the full payment of
\$50,000 for this grant last month and with the

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help of the Donnelley Foundation, a request for
proposal to complete the work is being
prepared. And just one last note in terms of
that, those who have not noticed, through the
help and support of residents of the Town and
staff, we've updated our website and I would
like to express my thanks to those residents in
the community, Ms. Gibson Bailey, Ms. Cheatham
and our staff who endeavored to provide
information to upgrade our website in the Town.
And I'll give my final report before I make
give way to Mr. McIver. The Chamber of
Commerce granted through the county through the
Myrtle Beach Chamber of Commerce, granted
\$10,000 to the Town of Atlantic Beach for
events advertisement and festivals and any
events that the Town deemed necessary to
utilize those funds for. This is the first
time since my administration that Myrtle Beach
and the Chamber of Commerce has offered support
for our events, primarily BikeFest, but can be
utilized for other planning events that the
Town deems necessary. So I would like to thank
them on behalf of the Council and the residents
for that grant award of \$10,000. At this time,

I'll have Mr. McIver come forth with two reports, a presentation, one, the Beautification Committee and all the Events and Festival Committee proposal.

MR. McIVER: Good afternoon.

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IN UNISON: Good afternoon ---

MR. McIVER: I'll just start off actually with the Events Committee. There's -- I had talked to Mr. Q. about establishing an Events/Festival Committee and -- to do holiday decorations, to do traditional, non-traditional events, Gullah Geechee programs and things like that. So, it sounds like you have some seed money for that committee. I'm not sure, I think that'll be a regular committee that the Council sponsors, just like the Beautification Committee, there will be a sign up in Town Hall for that committee if you're interested in serving on the Festival/Event Committee. We were asked as Beautification Committee to the help with Christmas decorations and we plant trees, we plant flowers, we don't do that.

COUNCILWOMAN GORE: Can I just say one thing? You know what comes along with beautification, right? Cleaning. I see the beautification

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going on but I don't see the -- I mean I don't i f t.he Beautification Committee that should be doing the cleaning but I mean like backwards to me, I just don't see how we're cleaning and nobody has cleaned anything for months but we're, I mean, I'm just saying -- I'm not trying to speak up on nothing, you I'm carry on, just saving it's all can backwards to me. And you all are doing a good job in the Beautification Committee but whoever the cleaning team is is not doing it, and it's going (inaudible) the dirt.

McIVER: We did provide a (inaudible) to Town Council, it's -- I did want to also mention that I did update all the minutes, I know you asked for that for a while so you all have our minutes that we've reduced. We also have a scope of what we actually have voted on or what we kind of work on. Firstly, I do clean, have no problems doing that. We had a beach sweep the -- about three weeks ago and actually cleaned up in the dunes actually not the beach that you would usually see but actually in the dunes, and I was out there for four hours cleaning the dunes so I don't mind

doing that, sometimes actually physically
cleaning but we do support the maintenance
as we can. A couple things I wanted to mention
that will be talked about a little bit later is
we've taken a recycling initiative, that'll be
coming out. We have someone from the Solid
Waste Authority that's gonna make a
presentation at our next Council meeting
talking about recycling so that's we have
adopted it as a program of ours. Santee light,
the lights, we're changing some of the amber
lights to LED, that was one of our early
projects, I think that's under way. Mr. Q., is
that correct? I think that project is underway
so that was one of our early projects that
we've taken over, and that seems to be going
well and And we also received a \$5,000
grant that we the Committee hasn't fully
developed what we're gonna do with that, but
that is on the way as well. Mr. Q., that's my
report.

MS. DRUMGOOLE: --- Council members, community and residents and visitors, good evening to all of My name is Vera Drumgoole. I have a few concerns as a resident of the Town of Atlantic Beach, one being if someone wanted to -- could explain to the residents how will the storm debris be removed because (inaudible) number two, when the tree fell near my house, they cut the tree and they placed the tree right front of the fire hydrant, that's a hazard. Ι called about it but still it's not being removed, and I understand that people are -there's other debris in the area but, to me, that should be a priority, and what I was told by the public works, that once the (inaudible) company gives the information because they cut down the tree, that it's on a list, that's my first concern. My second concern is the completion of the road work that the Town of

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Atlantic Beach did. Now, I have issues in
regards to that because once they created the
new pavement, they created a gap between the
new pavement and it's an easement, which is
the right-of-way, which is causing damage to my
car and there's also a few Town members who are
disabled who have to walk in that area in order
to get back and forth to their property, not
I spoke to Mr. Quattlebaum in regards to this
and I also spoke to someone within the City of
Conway, I'm waiting to hear back from that, but
I would like the Council to understand me, as
a resident, and I'm pretty sure I'm not the
only one concerned in regard to the way they
created a in my opinion, a mess of a roadway
which it should've been improved but it wasn't.
My third concern in (inaudible) is about the
speeds, the speeding on 32nd Avenue.
Apparently, no one sees that mileage sign at
the corner of 17 because it is old, you can't
it's not the paint that's coming off of
it and apparently there's somebody's to me,
somebody's gonna be walking out there in the
street like they do in the old days and
somebody's gonna be hit by a car excuse me

1	hit by a car and it's gonna be very damaging						
2	to Atlantic Beach so somebody really needs to						
3	take care of that. Those are my concerns.						
4	Thank you, Council.						
5	IN UNISON: Thank you.

7	MAYOR EVANS: Laura Winston-Tuggles. Hello, state						
8	your name for the record please.						
9	MS. WINSTON-TUGGLES: Good evening, everyone.						
10	IN UNISON: Good evening.						
11	MS. WINSTON-TUGGLES: My question was primarily on						
12	planning. I own the lot on 712 30th Avenue and						
13	I've studied the ordinance, and the challenge						
14	that I have is parking. According to the						
15	ordinance, it's commercial on the bottom,						
16	residential on the top. I know like the Town						
17	has parcels available and I was just wondering						
18	if some of those parcels can be used for						
19	parking.						
20	COUNCILWOMAN GORE: What are you asking about, the						
21	Town's property?						
22	MS. WINSTON-TUGGLES: Yeah. Just in general because						
23	going by the ordinance, it's kinda impossible						
24	to follow the ordinance and build something						

with commercial and residential on top, it's

really challenging. 1 like And I'm about economic development in the Town, I mean it's 2 3 a pleasure to be here, and like the gentleman 4 pointed, you know, the lot that's being leased, 5 is there any properties that can be available 6 for parking or just -- especially when there's 7 growth, where are they gonna park. I know that 8 on the left and the right of us there were some 9 revisions and parkings were made -- public 10 parking spaces were made available as well as 11 brought revenue to the Town for parking SO 12 that's my question and just my proposal as well. 13

- 14 MAYOR EVANS: Okay. I guess -- on 30th Avenue?

WINSTON-TUGGLES: Okay. 6 MAYOR EVANS: --- there's gonna be nowhere to park 7 on that 50 by 150 lot so if somebody's doing 8 something commercial on that main street, it's 9 probably gonna end up -- require more than one 10 lot or unless, like you're saying, if you can see somebody who wants to lease their lot to 11 12 you for parking or something. 13 MS. WINSTON-TUGGLES: Okay. So I would ---14 MAYOR EVANS: It's my -- I mean, help me out, guys. 15 MR. QUATTLEBAUM: That's basically the way it is now 16 unless the zoning or the ordinance is changed 17 in terms of the parking -- well, the parking 18 requirement now, based on the zoning, you're 19 absolutely right, it does restrict ---20 MS. WINSTON-TUGGLES: Exactly. 21 MR. QUATTLEBAUM: --- on what you can develop ---22 Exactly. MS. WINSTON-TUGGLES: 2.3 MR. QUATTLEBAUM: --- on the lots there. I don't 24 know the immediate solution because vou mav

have property owners on both sides of you ---

- 1 MS. WINSTON-TUGGLES: Right, uh-huh.
- 2 MR. QUATTLEBAUM: --- and your issue is then where are you gonna develop a commercial property ---
  - MS. WINSTON-TUGGLES: That's correct, that's correct.
  - MR. QUATTLEBAUM: --- where would you park? It's a real issue ---
- 7 | MS. WINSTON-TUGGLES: It is.

- MR. QUATTLEBAUM: --- the Mayor is only responding to at this point based on the current zoning ordinance, you would have to acquire additional land to -- in order to build.
- MS. WINSTON-TUGGLES: But that's not possible ---
- MR. QUATTLEBAUM: I agree with you, I'm just telling you what is, it's an issue that Council would want to address (inaudible) but that's a long-term issue ---
- MS. WINSTON-TUGGLES: I just heard that a parking -as far as the leasing out properties like to
  the -- a private entity, if there's a way that
  we could put our parking lot somewhere near
  30th Avenue because if there's growth near -because you have to be within 300 feet, parking
  within 300 feet, just something to consider,
  because if we have economic development, you're
  gonna have traffic, you're gonna have cars

- through, and that's like the 1 coming most 2 challenging -- challenging not just for myself, 3 other people as well so I just wanted to point 4 that out and hopefully the Council can find a 5 solution to address the parking issue that 6 comes with economic growth.
