A lot of them because they're not here everyday or weekly to see what the conditions of the

town are. It has been a challenge to try to keep to maintain they're property. What I've taken as an aggressive approach in some cases, having those ones that are extreme, cleaned up and filing leans and charging those individuals to have their properties cleaned. That's what we can do. And we have done. The town and council have approved on several occasions, us putting out dumpsters at the towns expense. For people to get rid of old property or items that are causing -- at the expense of the town -- get that done. So were trying aggressively. But it is a challenge. It's a community thing that I think collectively residents are going to have to join with us and put pressure on those co-owners to make them. There has been some improvements. Some of them are taking responsibility. But we still have a number of issues that are still out there.

MS. DEESE-MORIEKO: Okay. And can I ask one other question?

MAYOR EVANS: Sure.

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MS. DEESE-MORIEKO: The apartment building -- is it on 31st Avenue -- that they gave the residents a certain date that they had to be out?

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MS. DEESE-MORIEKO: What I read was that it was only going to stay vacant possibly a year.

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Yes.

MS. DEESE-MORIEKO: All right. We go back to status quo after a year with the type of residents that are there?

OUATTLEBAUM: The judge made a decision. MR. No. We tried to get it closed permanently. judge made a decision and determination that it would only be closed for a year. We're hoping that those are the bad element that was in the apartments, will be displaced and will not come We can't quarantee that. back. But at highly same time, displacement for a year is unlikely that people will come back to place. We can't quarantee that. But that was the best we could get decision from the judge.

MS. DEESE-MORIEKO: All right. That's it. Thank you.

MAYOR EVANS: And just to follow up on some of the comments that he made about people cleaning their properties. He probably gets beat over the head by the council as a whole about that same issue more than anything else. That's

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something that's very important to us. The appearance of this town. The curb appeal. The over grown lots. We ride him like a horse that. we're going to get about So that straight if don't anything else wе get straight. And I'm glad to hear you speak on that as well, thank you. William Booker?

BOOKER: This is twice in a row. MR. Mavor Council, William Booker. I'm not going to make this a habit. but I'm going to start by My wife thanking Mayor and Mr. Quattlebaum. and I have talked to you on more that occasion about some things that we wanted to have addressed in the town. And those things have been addressed. And following uр neighbor, Brenda. There is -- there is work going on. There are things that are being done citizens and the Council that the are interested in having taken care of. And I see that stuff taking place. The other subject that I'd like to talk about is the one that I spoke about last meeting that I attended. that's the item -- the agenda item that tabled today about the property purchase over on -- at the corner of 30th and Highway 17.

The reason I'm speaking about this this
project, is because I'm very concerned about
wise use of funds. I wouldn't spend my money
on that project. And I would question whether
from what I've seen and the conversations
I've had with each of you whether you'd
spend your personal money on that project.
That piece of land is slightly more than half
a standard lot. A standard lot is 7500 square
feet. That lot is only 3900 square feet. It
is decreasing in value in terms of how the
county is assessing that property. Where as
most of the property in the town, as far as
assessments go, are increasing in assessments.
It's gone from 100,000 to 58,000 about 3 or 4
years ago. Now it's down to 52,000 and some
odd dollars. So the value of it is decreasing.
It's been sitting on that corner and it's been
offered for sale for about as long as I've been
in the town. And no one is has expressed an
interest in that property, to my knowledge.
And so, when I don't know that anybody is
expressing an interest in it today. So, I'm
wondering why it is that we, the town, would
take our tax payer money and spend almost

double for the property that based on the
assessment and no body else is interested in
it. It seems like we would be one, if we just
had to have that property. I'm struggling with
why we just got to have it. I was told that we
are going to put a monument up for some of the
forefathers of the town and I can support
that. But we have a lot of land, a lot of
different places where we can put those
monuments up and use that money for some other
purpose that's gonna be that's not being
addressed right now. So I just want to share
with you my feelings and the feelings of some
of the other citizens that I've talked with
about this project. And I I just want to
share that I think that we can do better with
our money. Especially all that property.
Because we've got properties on in the town
that are selling for 50 and 60 thousand. Full
lots. And this is just slightly more than a
half a lot. It's selling for well we're
willing to pay 90,000 91,000. I just think
it's a poor use of funds. Thank you.

MAYOR EVANS: Thank you Mr. Booker. Actually, I'm only one person up here. But I support the

town purchasing that property. And there's a
number of reasons why I think it's a good idea
and I support the purchase of that property.
I have spoken with a number of residents of the
town as well and they support us purchasing
this property as well. So I'm sure there are
some who don't agree as well. But as far as
the lot size, we are aware that it's not a full
lot. And I know you gave us some number from
your podium. And I would probably challenge
some of the numbers that gave us. The lot on
Highway 17, that is a full lot. That is 50 by
150 versus of what we're planning to pay for
this lot I think is a substantial amount
lower. The other thing is, I've been on Town
Council here for better than 16 years going
on 20 years. As far as being blessed to buy a
lot, means a lot to me. Before this Council
took seat I think four years ago we
couldn't even buy a piece of bubble gum. So
much less than a lot. So this is something
that is dear to me. I've been a resident of
Atlantic Beach my entire sixty something years
on this earth here. And there are a lot of our
forefathers who will be forgotten I feel

if they are not recognized in some type of
decent way. if something happens we don't
know what happens down the road. We may be
forced to unite with North Myrtle Beach or the
county or anybody. but if we was to a memorial
out beside Highway 17, we're pretty much
guaranteed that it will be here forever. Yeah,
there's other lots. We've just done a great
thing in acquiring all the housing authority
properties. But none of that has Highway 17
frontage. If you're not Highway 17 frontage
when Highway 17 gets build up, you won't be
able to see nothing on this side of the street
or down there either. So it means a lot to me
to recognize Mr. Jim Lewis. Mr. Rooker. Mr.
Emery Gore. Mr. Skeeter. All all these
people that a lot of people in town today never
even heard of. This is why we are here today.
And I thank those people for blessing me to
have my reign at trying to lead this town. And
I want to bless them with something that will
be left permanently for them. So it's nothing
that we're trying to do underhanded. If this
goes through, we're going to go step by step.
Make sure we do everything right. If we have

to do a resolution ordinance whatever we
have to do we're going to do it correctly.
I've been on the phone daily with the municipal
association, the ethics commission, anybody who
can guide me to make sure that we do this
right. We're going to do it right. We're
going to do respectfully. People who are
against it, I want to hear them. And people
who are for it. And at the end of the day,
whatever we decide we're going to do for this
town, will not be in my hands. But it will be
left up left up to the majority of Council
here. Now, if they're in agreement with it and
we go forward though it, I hope you guys will
support us whole heartily in every way you can.

COUNCILMAN EVANS: Yeah. Yeah, I'd like to something. That piece of property has a contract on it. That signed on a billboard that pays about 500 some dollar or -- a month. Or the loan on it is 4.7. It'll pay for itself. It's win-win situation so I don't see an argument. Because (inaudible) it'll pay for itself. I just want you to know that. Thank you.

MAYOR EVANS: Any other Council members?

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COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Well, I just like to say, Mayor, that we have 9 lots that was just given to us. And to do us a memorial garden -- which is nice, don't get me wrong -- but if you build it down, half where the town or down town, that brings people into the town. So other business can benefit from it. But on 17, I quarantee you in 90 days it'll be vandalized. It'll be It would -- it would just damage sprayed on. And we would have to put money back into it. And money back into it again. it again. But I think we should think twice. But like say, you got the majority of Council, so, hey. That's it.

COUNCILWOMAN GORE: And I don't really want corrupt anything anybody said because I'm going to agree with these two. But at the same time, Ms. Jo, I really don't think that we're in a town that we will actually have to worry about anything being vandalized. We have out there where the -- the guy had the yard stuff out there. Where he have his granite up there --Jasper had granite up there. I don't so much think that wehave to worry about anybody

we can't predict whether somebody's going to vandalize it or not. But at the end of the day whether it's on Highway 17 or down the street somewhere, they can vandalize anyway anywhere we put it. But anyway, I just wanted to respond to that. That's all the public comment cards that we have.

MAYOR EVANS: Oh, I didn't? I'm sorry. Ms. Gloria Lance.

MS. LANCE: (inaudible) -- you had just forgotten me because we had a wonderful conversation of Saturday. A very truthful conversation. I'm Gloria Lance, former Councilwoman of the Town of Atlantic Beach and Jake and I will probably be in the running for the number of years that I've been on council, so ... But I just had -- I asked Jake a question in reference to the millage, tax millage.

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MS. LANCE: And the tax millage is 0.1681. If you go down -- if you continue looking, the highest on here is Loris. The city of Loris, about five down.

The residents who live here on a full-time basis -- as a thank you. I remember jumping off of -- won't do it today off a waste management truck giving out those trash cans to people. That's been over And the town has been paying that. 20 years. Business owners -- who are making money off of their businesses -- have trash cans. Why? is that happening Council.

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Why do people have trash cans?

- MAYOR EVANS: Business owners who have businesses that's supposed to have dumpsters. Why do they have trash cans? And we're paying for it, why?
- MR. QUATTLEBAUM: It's something you've raised and said your concerned that we have address, in terms of those business owners. But you're absolutely right. They're not supposed to have -- it's required to have a dumpster. Anything over -- in four units.
