MAYOR EVANS: This Town Council Special Session Meeting is called to order this Wednesday, September 11th, year 2019. Roll call?

MAYOR EVANS: We're down to ceremonial matters. Council members, anybody have any ceremonial matters? And if not, the next item, the approval of the agenda. Council, seek a motion to approve the agenda as it is outlined? COUNCILMAN EVANS: So moved.

COUNCILWOMAN GORE: I seek -- second.
MAYOR EVANS: Motion and a second for approval of the agenda. Any other questions or comments? Roll call?

## Old Business:

MAYOR EVANS: We're down to Number 6, Old Business, Town Council meeting minutes. Minutes from Town Council Meeting held on July $23 r d, 2019$ and August 5th, 2019. Council, I see a motion for the approval of those minutes.

COUNCILWOMAN GORE: I seek a motion to approve the Town Council minutes for Town Council meetings July $23 r d, 2019$ and August the 5th, 2019 .

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MAYOR EVANS: Okay, motion made by Councilwoman Gore. Can I get a second?

COUNCILMAN EVANS: Second.
MAYOR EVANS: Okay. There's a motion and seconded by Councilman Evans to adopt the meeting minutes from August -- I mean July 23 rd and August 5th of 2019 . Any other questions or comments? Roll call?

CLERK: Councilman Lenearl Evans?
COUNCILMAN EVANS: Yea.
CLERK: Councilwoman Josephine Isom?
COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Yea.
CLERK: Councilwoman Jacqueline Gore?
COUNCILWOMAN GORE: Yea.

MAYOR EVANS: Yea. Motion granted. We're down to Item A under Old Business, Ordinance Number 42019, Amendment to Ordinance Number 4-2018. An ordinance establishing and adopting the operational procedures for the year 2020 Atlantic Beach Memorial Day Black Pearl Cultural Heritage and Bike Festival, and this will be the second reading. Council, seek a motion to adopt Ordinance Number 4-2019, second reading.

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COUNCILMAN EVANS: So moved.

COUNCILWOMAN GORE: Second.

MAYOR EVANS: Motion and a second to adopt Ordinance Number 4-2019. Any other questions or comments?

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Mayor, just for the public, the major change for 2020 Bike Fest is a decrease in the vendor fees from $\$ 875$ for food down to $\$ 675$, and 50 percent on 31 st Avenue at $\$ 350$. All other procedures and costs remain the same. After May the $17 t h$, vendors -- retail and food -- who did not register will pay the 2018 amount of $\$ 875$ for food and $\$ 850$ for retail. So that is the most substantial change in the ordinance for Bike Fest.

New Business:
MAYOR EVANS: We're down to New Business. And Item A under New Business, this is Resolution Number 3-2019. And this is a resolution providing 10 percent Town match for the CDBG grant application of community development grant funding for the park improvement project. Council, seek a motion to adopt Resolution Number 3-2019.

COUNCILMAN EVANS: So moved.
COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Second.
MAYOR EVANS: There is a motion and a second to adopt Resolution Number 3-2019. Any other questions or comments?

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Mayor, Council and public, this resolution is being presented as a recommendation for a grant. Community Development Block Grant application that the Town of Atlantic Beach, working in collaboration with the Waccamaw COG, will be submitting on September the 16 th for the amount of $\$ 150,000$ to comprehensively renovate the park adjacent to the community center. CDBG requirements -- require a 10 percent match by the Town, not to exceed $\$ 10,000$-- I mean $\$ 15,000$ if we are awarded the full amount. The 10 percent will be relative to the amount of the award. It could be up to $\$ 150,000$. There is a meeting following this meeting -immediately following this meeting conducted by the Waccamaw Cog to get resident input on the proposed design for the park and concept, and also the cost estimates that we've engaged a professional to provide a design for the comprehensive renovation of the park area adjacent to the community center.
MAYOR EVANS: Any other questions or comments, Council? Roll call?

CLERK: Councilman Lenearl Evans?
COUNCILMAN EVANS: Yea.
CLERK: Councilwoman Josephine Isom?
COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Yea.
CLERK: Councilwoman Jacqueline Gore?
COUNCILWOMAN GORE: Yea.
CLERK: Mayor Jake Evans?
MAYOR EVANS: Yea. Motion granted. We're down to Item C, Ordinance Number 6-2019. And this is -- no, I'm sorry, we're down B. I skipped over B. We're down to Item B, Ordinance Number 52019. And this is an ordinance to adopt the
increase of Town Council salaries. And Council, $I$ think what we were discussing is to increase the Mayor's salary to $\$ 6,000$ a year, and increase the Town Council's salary to $\$ 4,800$ a year.

## (Inaudible background noise.)

MAYOR EVANS: So, is that correct?
COUNCILWOMAN GORE: Uh-huh.
MAYOR EVANS: I think the $\$ 500$ and $\$ 400$ monthly for Council members, is that correct?

MULTIPLE SPEAKERS: Uh-huh.
MAYOR EVANS: Okay. Council, seek a motion?
COUNCILWOMAN GORE: I seek a motion for the Ordinance Number 5-2019, an ordinance to adopt -- increase the Town Council salaries.

COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Second.
MAYOR EVANS: There is a motion and a second to adopt Ordinance Number 5-2019, an increase in the Town Council salaries. Any other question or comments?

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Mayor and Council, the salary for the Council was -- has not been increased since the year 2002. Currently, Council is paid -Town Council members $\$ 200$ per month, $\$ 2,400$ a year; and $\$ 300$ per month for the Mayor's position at $\$ 3,600$.

MAYOR EVANS: Okay. What did I do? Did I call-did we call the roll?

MULTIPLE SPEAKERS: No.
MAYOR EVANS: No? We need roll call.
CLERK: Councilman Lenearl Evans?
COUNCILMAN EVANS: Yea.
CLERK: Councilwoman Josephine Isom?
COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Yea.

MAYOR EVANS: Yea. I forgot to note that this is the first reading and we have to have a second reading on this, correct?

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: That's correct.
MAYOR EVANS: For the record, this is just the first reading.

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: And also, Mayor, if passed it does not take effect until January 2020 .

MAYOR EVANS: Thank you.
COUNCILMAN EVANS: January 21?
MULTIPLE SPEAKERS: 2020.
MAYOR EVANS: The first of the year, Uh-huh. Okay. We're down to C, Ordinance Number 6-2019. And

COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Mr. Mayor, I make a motion that we adopt the Ordinance Number 6-2019, amendment to the Ordinance Number 96-06, hospitality taxes proposed increase from 1 percent to 2 percent.

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Mayor and Council, in 1996 this ordinance went into effect, granting a 1 percent hospitality tax to the local municipality and 1 percent to the county. In April -- March or April of 2019, municipalities -- the tax was supposed to only take place for a 10 year -- to 2016 . The County continued to collect the tax even though the ordinance only granted it to the year 2016. Municipalities sued the County -- it's under litigation -- and the County has stopped collecting their 1 percent tax. So this allows, or will as drafted by our legal counsel, the municipality
Town of Atlantic Beach to collect and increase that hospitality tax paid from 1 percent to 2 percent. One modification after reviewing the legal counsel's drafting of this ordinance, Mayor, I saw that the collection in the ordinance was to be done monthly. I would like to amend that and recommend that the collection be done quarterly as opposed to monthly.

MAYOR EVANS: Okay. I think the motion was made and we didn't get a second yet. So that is -- need to be an amendment made to that motion to -- I think it's 4(C), where it reads taxes and required reports shall be submitted to the Town quarterly instead of monthly. It reads monthly, but we want to do it quarterly. So we want to amend 4(C) to read quarterly instead of monthly. So the motion's been made and we're just amending it to say quarterly instead of monthly, but you do need a second.
(Inaudible background noise.)
COUNCILWOMAN GORE: Okay. Is she going to have to say it again?

MAYOR EVANS: No, you just need the second. COUNCILWOMAN GORE: Second.

MAYOR EVANS: All right. Any other questions or comments? Roll call?

CLERK: Councilman Lenearl Evans?
COUNCILMAN EVANS: Yea.
CLERK: Councilwoman Josephine Isom?
COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Yea.

MAYOR EVANS: Yea. Motion granted. We're down to D. And this is the Municipal Election Commission. And we have reappointment due for Joe Montgomery and Kenneth McIver. Council... Did you all have the -- were those schedules in here?

MAYOR EVANS: So one says six years and one says four years?

COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Yeah.
COUNCILMAN EVANS: Joe's was for six years.
COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Right.
COUNCILMAN EVANS: Kenneth is four.
(Inaudible background noise.)
MAYOR EVANS: Go ahead. Yeah, I seek a motion.
COUNCILWOMAN GORE: Okay. I seek a motion to reappoint Mr. Joe Montgomery for a term of six years and Kenneth McIver for a term of four years.

COUNCILMAN EVANS: Second ---
COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Second.
MAYOR EVANS: There's a motion and a second for the reappointment of Joe Montgomery for six years and Kenneth McIver for the term of four years. Any other questions or comments? Roll call?

CLERK: Councilman Lenearl Evans?
COUNCILMAN EVANS: Yea.
CLERK: Councilwoman Josephine Isom?
COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Yea.
CLERK: Councilwoman Jacqueline Gore?
COUNCILWOMAN GORE: Yea.
CLERK: Mayor Jake Evans?
MAYOR EVANS: Yea. Motion granted. We're down to E, Planning Commission. Do we have those here too?
(Inaudible background noise.)
MAYOR EVANS: So Council, we're seeking the reappointment of Orton Bellamy, who's the chair, for a term of two years. Derrick Stevens, who's the vice chair, for a term of two years. And Timothy Vereen for a term of four years. And Esco McFadden for a term of
four years. And Poterressia McNeil for a term of three years. Seek that motion, Council?

COUNCILWOMAN GORE: So moved.
COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Second.
MAYOR EVANS: Any other questions or comments?
MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Mayor and Council and public, the Planning Commission over the last year has worked diligently on the revision of the Land Management Ordinance currently now under review by legal counsel for final recommendation and adoption by the Planning Commission. Once adopted by the Planning Commission, the Land Management Ordinance will be submitted to the Council for approval through an ordinance which -- in two readings. The time projection for that submission, hopefully we can get it -- the Commission to have it adopted in -- by the October meeting, to Council by the October meeting. The Planning Commission has worked diligently as i indicated throughout the year, working with the Waccamaw $C O G$ in modifying and enhancing the Land Management Ordinance which was last done in 2001 .
(Inaudible background noise.)
MAYOR EVANS: Where did we stop at? Did we call the
roll?
COUNCILWOMAN GORE: I seek a motion.
MAYOR EVANS: I think the motion was made ---
COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: The motion was made and seconded.

MAYOR EVANS: --- I think we just need to call the roll.

CLERK: Roll call.
MR. QUATTLEBAUM: One other thing, the Town Clerk has contacted each of the commissioners and they have agreed to serve the term.

MAYOR EVANS: Thank you. Roll call?
CLERK: Councilman Lenearl Evans?
COUNCILMAN EVANS: Yea.
CLERK: Councilwoman Josephine Isom?
COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Yea.
CLERK: Councilwoman Jacqueline Gore?
COUNCILWOMAN GORE: Yea.
CLERK: Mayor Jake Evans?
MAYOR EVANS: Yea. Motion granted.
Report:
MAYOR EVANS: We're down to the Town Manager's Report.

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Mayor, Council and public, I'm reporting out that the Town Mayor and myself

MAYOR EVANS: We're down to Public Time. Chris Drungu? Where's the microphone?

## (Inaudible background noise.)

MR. DRUNGU: Good afternoon.
COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Good afternoon.
MR. DRUNGU: I just want to use two minutes real quick to express a couple of concerns I have -or a couple of questions for Council. You know, election time is here, $I$ just want to know if Council is re-elected, the same exact Council, is Mayor or any of you guys, public officials, on the ballet this year? Or anyone running? Whoever's elected, I just want to know if we're really focused on looking toward making permanent positive overall direction --
changes for the Beach for its public and reputation -- for its public reputation and it's perception? The way this beach is perceived and the reputation of our beach, I think we should have higher standards for ourselves with our -- the way our neighboring -- some of what $I$ hear from our neighboring towns when we communicate about Atlantic Beach, it's just -- it's not good. I think that should be a big focus on whoever's elected, focus on changing. Also I'd like to see improvement to our infrastructure and, you know, not just the Town's grounds and things like this, but our already-standing structures like our apartment buildings, residential buildings, private homes. I would like to know if you guys have worked out -- the private owners and the residential and the business owners work to make their properties look better, help their properties, you know, be standard, be a better quality than it is because the bar down the road on 30 th Avenue needs a lot of help. And if we can as a town get together somehow, work to help them, I mean it comes back. It think it will bring better
business to them and increase the property value of the Town. You know, I just think it's a better thing, what whoever's elected should look at. Another thing $I$ think whoever is elected should look at is opening up newer businesses in the Town, businesses that the entire North Myrtle Beach can use. Maybe even other towns around Myrtle Beach. Something like banks or day cares, something to bring in business from the entire county not just look to please the people of Atlantic Beach. And also, work with other towns around here when, you know, look to donate to their businesses and help their businesses, maybe they'll be more than willing to help -- to look into helping us one day. You know, let's do business, open up relations and communications with neighboring towns, adjacent towns. I think you guys should look into that. Whoever's elected should look into that. And I just think whoever's elected should work to see that Atlantic Beach is at the forefront of Horry County when it comes to social and economic standings and the quality of life, and not lag behind in any way at all. That's all, you guys. Thank you.

COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Thank you.
MAYOR EVANS: Brenda Rhue?
MS. RHUE: Good afternoon, everybody.
MULTIPLE VOICES: Good afternoon.
MS. RHUE: Well, some of y'all know me and some of you don't. I am a native of Atlantic Beach. I grew up in Atlantic Beach before I left for New York. And $I$ would like -- I need to hire you. You said everything I need.

MR. DRUNGU: (Inaudible.)
MS. RHUE: What $I$ would like to see Atlantic Beach do -- $I$ heard y'all talking about the playground. I think one of our things we need to do mainly is advertising. We need to start with advertising because that will bring, like the young man said, other businesses coming in. What I'd like to do is come in and allow other business. I partnership with different businesses all over Horry County. Matter a fact, I spoke to the Salvation Army and they're willing to bring the food in. I would love to see a soup kitchen. And during the winter time, people are hungry, people are homeless. We don't want to house them, we want to feed
them. We want to let them know the Black Pearl is still alive and we are here to help you. Some of the things $I$ would like to see to come is activities for the children. Our children have been thrown to the side now. The juvenile system is getting our children. We have to do something to keep our children's attention and I'm looking at some kind of activity to come down -- some kind of training class or something to bring to Atlantic Beach. Not only that, our partnership with all the other stores down here in North Myrtle Beach -- I've had two community centers in -- Finklea Community Center and Loris Community Center, and we did pretty good. We've got houses down there from South Carolina Disaster. We've got the bus line coming down there. So I really believe if y'all will give me a chance to come in here -like the young man said -- all of these things, we have been sitting long enough and we are a pearl. So we need to let people know in the world that we're still here and it's not only negative, it's gonna be positive. So I don't want to take your whole day out and the whole night telling y'all so many things, so many
things that $I$ have the opportunity that I could bring to Atlantic Beach. There's businesses that I've spoke to -- lawyers, doctors -- who's willing to come in and invest. Some of the things $I$ would like to see, the front street looking like Market Common. We can do that. We can have the houses on the top, rentals. Summer and winter rentals. And we have our stores on the bottom. I have businesses -chiropractors, black-owned chiropractors. Not that we don't want different businesses, but we want them to know this is the Black Pearl. So I've already had African people coming up. Some of y'all have spoke to some of my people. Dennis, he's coming in, wanting to do that shows. We want to bring in culture. We want to bring in different things that -- art shows. We want to have an art store where people can come in and know who we are and where we come from. I'm not gonna hold it up, but $I$ know what I'm doing, so y'all just let me make the change.
