MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Council had requested a moratorium zoning and permissible review the within the Highway 17 Commercial District and to give -- the Planning Commission is going through the process of reassessing permissible uses under the Highway 17 Commercial District as well as a broader review of zoning in the Town of Atlantic Beach. And the Council has requested a moratorium until they can assess and determine what permissible uses they want to modify or amend for -- that are currently allowed under the current zoning ordinance, and to give the Planning Commission the opportunity to review and make recommendations to Council on any modifications to the zoning.

MR. THOMPSON: Okay, so this sounds like something that you would want to try to protect the Town to make sure what's done on 17 doesn't -- Council would agree to that, that's what this sounds like to me. But does that sound right to you, that this be the interpretation?

1 MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Yes, it's determined ---

COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Yeah.

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: --- in terms of what uses in the Town that are beneficial and amenable to the Town, and make an assessment and determine -- reassess the terms of what already is the zoning -- permissible uses under the zoning requirements.

- MR. THOMPSON: And if in fact the Council sees fit that some of the uses that are currently in the zoning that may need to be modified then they would make a suggestion at this -- at some later date as to changing that to what their like minds would be? Is that correct?
- MR. QUATTLEBAUM: It would have to come through the Planning Commission. It would have to go through their process and Town public hearings and then make a recommendation to Council, and Council then would have to make a determination based on the recommendation from the Planning Commission.
- MR. THOMPSON: Great. It sounds like you all are trying to protect the Town and that's great. Thank you.

So with that being said, anything that is
considered items of high public interest or
urgency, especially when it comes to our
community, our municipality, and the Town then,

of course, we want to go ahead and move it forward because the situating of the moratorium is very important. So I just wanted to back that up and just -- back up and re-go over that piece (ph) with you. Second of all, I wanted to say to you, I understand you asking the questions about the meth clinic. That is a direction that the City Manager will go further into, but definitely the moratorium is being put in place for permissible businesses that can enhance our Town with economical growth ---

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: That's correct.

MS. PIERCE-FORD: Okay, I think -- I think that's where the clarity needed to come in. I think that's where all the confusion was. No one was saying that. We need to be specific when we're talking to the Town's people, as well as property owners, that the fact that this moratorium would allow businesses to submit an application. However, because of a moratorium put in place by the Town Council, it would give us the opportunity to deny them for the next six months, am I correct?

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: That's correct.

MS. PIERCE-FORD: Okay, thank you.

MS. HILL: Thanks, Maria.

(Inaudible background noise.)

MAYOR EVANS: So we -- so we have voted on the second reading already? We're just in Public Time right now, is that correct ---

COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: No, Mayor. No ---

COUNCILWOMAN WILLIAMS: Not yet ---

COUNCILWOMAN WILLIAMS: Well, Mr. Mayor, this is Councilwoman Glenda Williams. I was trying to speak for a while now. If you don't mind, and I know -- I do respect -- I've given other people the opportunity to speak for -- thank for clarification. asking you for was actually trying to say, you know, prior to actually -- before waiting to speak that directly where we are. When it comes to the moratorium, it is to protect the Town. have any -- I don't have a problem saying I too

agree to what Mr. Sketers was saying as it
relates to the Town, protecting the Town, also
making sure that whatever comes into the Town,
commercialism-wise, residential, whatever
happens in the Town, it is for the better
growth of the town. We do not have the
manpower when it comes to our Police
Department, or any other department, to handle
such things as a methadone clinic coming to the
place. Not only that, we do not want the Town
smeared after taking a few years to clean up
the name, or the stigmatism, that has always
been on Atlantic Beach when it comes to drugs.
So again, I was trying to speak, Ms. Ford, and
thank you for asking for clarity to saying that
the purposes of it is to withhold the Town and
to carry forth, especially after a lot of work
has been done, to protect the citizens and with
the Police Department now, the crime rate is
down, and the Town is in the betterment of
the Town is in a much better place that it was
before. So I do agree with you and, again,
that moratorium will protect as far as someone
submitting another application for such type
entities coming to the Town.
