- MS. COLEMAN: Mr. Mayor, members of the Council, thank you for giving me the opportunity to be
- here tonight. My name is Carol Coleman. I am
- 18 the Local Planning Services Director for the
- 19 Waccamaw Regional Council of Governments, and
- 20 we are contracted to provide planning services
- 21 to the Town of Atlantic Beach. And this is the
- result of a request to allow for duplexes to be
- 23 subdivided in the R2 District that we received
- a few months ago, and I believe the person who
- 25 initially inquired is here tonight so you can

ask her directly as well but what I did for you
tonight was I put together a packet of
information very similar to what I gave
Planning Commission the other day when we
discussed it. And on page 1 of your handout,
you'll see the definition for the R2 District,
or the intent of the R2 District, the
residential district, is to preserve and
protect the character of Atlantic Beach
neighborhoods. Residential uses range from
single-family detached to multi-family at
densities that are compatible with existing
housing. This district may provide for
innovative design including, but not limited
to, zero-lot-line development. And then it
goes on to say that some other uses may be
allowed as well, but I wanted to underline that
to give you the idea that zero-lot-line was
written into the district from day one. I then
have the definitions for the different types of
family housing uses. Duplexes are seen as two-
family dwellings. You can see duplexes is
defined as a building, located on a single lot,
designed for or occupied exclusively by two
families living independent of each other in

separate dwellings. On page 2, I included the
table for District Bulk, Dimensional and
Density Standards, Table 5.3.420A. At the top
of the second column, I've outlined R2, and you
can see that currently the minimum lot area for
the R2 District is 6,000 square feet. Then
when you follow it down, you can see where I've
circled in red single-family attached as well
as two-family dwellings because those are the
two things that we kept going back and forth
between. Single-family attached already
allowed are already allowed in the district,
and two-family dwellings are allowed but they
couldn't be split out. So the use is already
fully permitted in the district by right and,
if you look at the table on the right of that
page, Table 5.3.502, you can see under
residential uses, single-family attached is a
conditional use in the R2 District, but two-
family dwellings or duplexes are permitted
already in the R2 District. So what they were
asking the ability to do is to be able to
subdivide it out fee simple, and the reason
comes and the applicant can tell you this,
or the person who requested this application,

can tell you this when you build a duplex,
you can build it with a construction loan but
then you can't out own it outright unless
you can subdivide them out. And we saw this in
Horry County. Also, I'm working with the Town
of Surfside Beach. They have this they had
this same issue, that people were having issues
with being able to finance them because they
had to have a horizontal property regime, and
it was a little bit more convoluted, a little
bit more complicated, and so we started doing
I started doing some research and looking at
the ability to do this. The first thing I was
concerned with was not zero-lot-line
development because we already had that by
definition in the zoning district that we're
talking about. But the biggest thing that I
had to overcome was the fact on page 4, at the
bottom of below the table, you can see
frontage, and frontage on each lot that's
created by this definition is required to be a
minimum of 50 feet. And I knew right off the
bat that if we split a 60 foot lot, we were
gonna have less than 50 feet, and thankfully,
when I read on into the ordinance, this is

already in the ordinance to allow the other
zoning districts that allow you to subdivide
them out and it says here that lots created
hereafter shall have frontage on and access to
a public street. No subdivision shall be
approved unless the lots to be subdivided shall
have a minimum of 50 feet of frontage on a
public street. This requirement made me reduce
to 35 feet for lots located on a cul-de-sac and
to 20 feet for a lot in an approved zero-lot-
line development if, in the opinion of the
administrator, such reduction would not hinder
lot access and all other requirements of the
chapter can be met. So, that gets us down
below 50 feet. So if you split a 60 foot lot
and each side is 30 feet, that's completely in
agreement with what's written into the zoning
ordinance. On page 5, I just took an aerial
side of an area of a part of Surfside Beach
and I have to tell you up-front you have to
kind of imagine it somewhat because when these
aerial photographs are taken and the parcel
information is put down on a GIS map, it's not
perfectly perpendicular so they may not line up
exactly like they you think they should, but

what you can see here is that you have duplexes
that are both split out and some that are on
the same lot. So they have the ability if
it's two family members and they don't have a
problem with a horizontal property regime or,
you know, one person pays for the construction
and either sells the other half out or leases
it for rental income, they may want it on one
piece of property. From a tax assessment
standpoint, two lots for two units is probably
gonna be a better tax assessment for the Town.
So ultimately, the proposed amendment to lot
area in the R2 District is to allow for two-
family dwellings on a minimum 6,000 square foot
lot to be split out, resulting in a minimum lot
area for each duplex of 3,000 square feet. And
I've played the devil's advocate and I looked
at the possibilities of having problems going
forward. So let's say that you approve this
and someone builds a duplex and 15 years from
now they tear the duplex down and you've got
two 3,000 square foot lots, unless you change
the ordinance, the only thing those 3,000 lot
square foot lots could be used for is a half
a duplex because you have to have a minimum of

6,000 square feet to build a duplex, you have to have a minimum of 6,000 square feet for the zoning district, except if you have a duplex. And if you have any specific questions, I'll be glad to try to address them. If you have any concerns. But again, the biggest point that I was trying to make is there's no change to the environment, there's built nо increase in density. This is a use that is permitted by right in your zoning ordinance. The only difference is that they have the ability to subdivide those lots out so each person can own a portion of the lot as well as their half of the duplex.

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: There was a proposal, if you recall, someone submitted a request of proposal to purchase the basketball court. What had happened was that that particular perspective purchaser initiated а survey pending the approval of Council to purchase the property. The surveyor, after -- I think that was November of 2020 that that proposal came in. When Council voted not to sell the property, the surveyor started back the process without the owner's consent to do a survey on property without their authorization. I spoke

to the owner of the or the proposed buyer of
that and the company that they had hired
pending the sale of the property to have the
survey done took it upon their own initiative
to conduct that survey. So I contacted and
researched it and found out that's what's
generated it. In terms of that, the purchaser
of this survey that wasn't supposed to take
place indicated that if she has to pay, she
will donate the survey to the Town. But it was
not authorized to do it. And the answer to the
question is no, it is not for sale.

- MS. WILLIAMS: Okay, so the final answer is, it wasn't authorized in January and it wasn't authorized in June?
- MR. QUATTLEBAUM: No.

- MS. WILLIAMS: I'll check that one off. And then, is the basketball goal location -- was it ever determined that we would have it not deemed a park? And what's the clarity on it?
- MR. QUATTLEBAUM: The latest status in terms of, because the Town received federal and state funding for the basketball court, under their requirements it has to remain a public facility, a public quote-unquote 'park' because

the Town received funding. And that is the current status of the park right now.

MS. WILLIAMS: Is it recent funding?

- MR. QUATTLEBAUM: No, no. It's been years, years ago. Years ago that the Town received funding to establish it as a quote-unquote 'park.'
- MS. WILLIAMS: Okay. But will you be looking into it 'cause after a certain number of years that that funding has been received then it, like, it can be amended or ---

That's only on the Fourth, but at the same time, it's still illegal to shoot fireworks in the Town of Atlantic Beach. When --- our particular problem is when my guys do go out, I'm pretty sure it is right that somebody went over to tell them they could anything they come shoot here and shoot fireworks. So we do get out with them, we tell them that they can't shoot here in Atlantic

So they go back to North Myrtle Beach also. Beach, North Myrtle sends them back over here, which we're trying to get that situation There is a park down a little bit solved. farther past on Myrtle Beach, it's a county park that they can shoot fireworks. I'm trying to find exactly where the location's at. somewhere I think past Cherry Grove. It's somewhere past Cherry Grove that is a part of the county that's on the beach that they can shoot fireworks.

COMMISSIONER THOMAS (ph): Well, it's not Atlantic.

POLICE CHIEF ROBINSON: Yeah, it's not Atlantic

you're correct. It's Atlantic Beach, not Beach. So, we don't allow fireworks here. And also, when they do shoot fireworks (inaudible) at nighttime, only got one vehicle out there can drive on the beach that and that's (inaudible). We've only got one vehicle that can drive on the beach. So when my guys do go out there, they go out there with red lights and stuff so these guys see us coming and take off running. So it's kinda hard to catch them. We try to do -- we don't have the manpower like North Myrtle Beach or Horry County that seeing

They do. We're just trying to catch ---
