17	(inaudible) the annual payment of \$12,000
18	approximately \$12,000 a year which we will pay
19	annually, the first payment will be in
20	February, and I hope to pay off the vehicles
21	prior to the four-year financing terms. Any

2	public to explain the necessity for the flood
3	manage flood damage prevention ordinance,
4	and I will turn it over to Ms. Carol Coleman at
5	this time.
6	MAYOR EVANS: Thank you.
7	MS. COLEMAN: Thank you so much for having me.
8	Carol Coleman, Waccamaw Regional Council of
9	Governments, and I did have conversations with
10	Mr. Quattlebaum when I realized that nothing
11	had happened in terms of adopting the new maps.
12	You probably heard, it's been in the news, in
13	the last few years that FEMA had done a new
14	flood study for Coastal South Carolina, the Low
15	Country real Low Country, low Low Country
16	so when I say that, I mean Beaufort County,
17	Jasper County, Charleston County, down south of
18	us. They passed theirs about two years ago and
19	most of Horry County has passed theirs, and I
20	was working with the Town of Surfside Beach to
21	get theirs passed and realized this one hadn't
22	gone through. Just to give you a little bit of
23	an overview, you probably made out better than
24	a lot of areas. Some properties have come out
25	of the flood zones, or out of the BE zones,



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1	which requires additional engineering designs
2	when you're on the oceanfront or a couple rows
3	off of it, so it will make it a little bit
4	easier to build, you might not have to build up
5	as high for your finished elevation as you
6	would have before, think you gained about four
7	feet (inaudible) on the whole if Surfside
8	Atlantic Beach, I apologize. I do want to take
9	a moment, Mr. Mayor, if I could. Actually, the
10	title reads as follows: an ordinance to amend
11	Exhibit D to the Flood Damage Prevention
12	Ordinance in order to adopt the Federal
13	Emergency Management Agency's latest flood
14	insurance study and accompanying flood
15	insurance rate maps for the Town of Atlantic
16	Beach, South Carolina. So the copy of the
17	ordinance that I have given you that is labeled
18	as Ordinance 9-2021 is almost verbatim the same
19	as the ordinance that's in place right now,
20	with the exception of the date, and we may want
21	to talk about this just a bit to figure out
22	which way to go from here. On page two and
23	Section 4, you'll see an underlined date which
24	is December 16th, 2021. That is the date by
25	which FEMA wanted this adopted. So obviously,

1	with today being the 13th, we cannot get it
2	adopted by the 16th, but I've been in touch
3	pretty repeatedly with the Department of
4	Natural Resources in Columbia, and we're hoping
5	that it won't cause any suspension or anything
6	else with regards to the Town of Atlantic Beach
7	and that once we get the second reading in
8	place and they have a copy that they can submit
9	on to FEMA, there will be a seamless transition
10	from the old map to the new maps. It comes
11	into play if someone comes in to get permits.
12	MAYOR EVANS: Excuse me, I want to make sure that
13	the people online are hearing you.
14	MS. COLEMAN: Uh-huh.
15	(Inaudible background noise.)
16	COUNCILWOMAN GORE: Denise
17	MS. GIBSON: Somewhat. Not really clearly but
18	somewhat. We can hear somewhat, yes
19	MS. COLEMAN: Okay, is that
20	COUNCILWOMAN GORE: Okay, how about now?
21	MS. COLEMAN: Can you hear me now?
22	MS. GIBSON: Yes, very much so now.
23	MAYOR EVANS: Thank you.
24	MS. COLEMAN: Okay. So, our goal date for adopting
25	these is December 16th, which is Thursday. We



1	have first reading tonight but, in the State of
2	South Carolina, I believe the municipal
3	requirement is you can't have two readings
4	within six days of each other so the earliest
5	we can adopt the second reading would be next
6	week. Like I said, I've been in touch with the
7	Department of Natural Resources for South
8	Carolina, they are FEMA's arm in South
9	Carolina, and they're aware of what's going on
10	and they just want to make sure we get the maps
11	adopted. Some places haven't adopted them yet.
12	I know Georgetown is appealing them in a number
13	of ways. Horry County did the same thing. But
14	most places have adopted them. I'm not sure
15	any other municipalities are outstanding, but
16	we can move forward with this. So, the first
17	change in the ordinance that you've got in your
18	packet is that date. Previously, the date I
19	believe was 1989 or Get back here. In the
20	ordinance as it's currently written was
21	September 17th, 2003 (ph) so that was probably
22	the last time the maps were changed in this
23	area. And then if you'll turn over, everything
24	else is the same until you get to page 19 and
25	there are quite a number of changes under



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1	accessory structures, that's because the
2	language that was in the ordinance changed in
3	the state model ordinance. So, they completely
4	rewrote that section so I rewrote this section
5	to reflect what's in the state model ordinance.
6	Not all of this ordinance was written to match
7	the state model ordinance, some places just use
8	the state model ordinance and adapt it for the
9	area where they're located. This one was
10	written separately but it is consistent with
11	the state model ordinance. So if you can adopt
12	this ordinance as it's currently proposed with
13	the accessory structures section changed as
14	proposed, you will be in compliance. And once
15	you adopt the second reading, the maps will
16	automatically be enforced.
17	COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Okay.
18	MS. COLEMAN: So anyone coming in for permits after
19	that date can use the new maps. And again,
20	it's a benefit to them rather than a detriment.
21	But the point of having this in place is so
22	that you can have, number one, participate in
23	the Flood Insurance Management Program with
24	FEMA so, if you have a property along the ocean
25	or within in the flood plains or flood

2	and it's declared a national emergency or	
3	disaster area, then you are eligible to get	
4	FEMA funds. And then also if you have a CRS	
5	program, which is community rating system, this	
6	is part of that. And if you have a specific	
7	questions, I'll be glad to address them, and	
8	I'll make sure that I do send you copies of the	
9	maps before you look at this again.	
10	MAYOR EVANS: Okay.	
11	MS. COLEMAN: But again, in discussing a proposed	
12	project in the area, we'd look at the maps to	
13	look at what the current requirements are in	
14	terms of how high they have to be from the	
15	finished elevation currently and how high they	
16	have to be after the new maps are adopted, and	
17	they came to about four feet to their favor.

You can go ahead, Ben. 2 QUATTLEBAUM: Yes, Mayor, Council and public, MR. 3 the State of South Carolina has passed a law 4 all municipalities be on that а uniform 5 business license fee collection cycle, which 6 runs from May of each year to April 30th. This 7 year, we started the process of transitioning 8 to state law and (inaudible) business license 30th 9 2022 to expire April оf and а full 10 business license year will start May 1st, 2022 to April 30th, 2023. Under the changes, major 11 12 changes, to the business license fee schedule 13 is that it will convert from a percentage 14 schedule to a flat dollar amount. The flat 15 dollar amounts are based on the categories or 16 the business' type. Each business will be 17 classified under the same guidelines in terms of how we will classify a business, certain 18 19 businesses, whether it's retail, whether it's 20 alcoholic beverages sales, all of them will 21 have a code or a number and classification. 22 Under that, instead of the percentages that are 23 used, there will be flat dollar amounts per and 24 thousand what I'm told \_ \_ and the 25 calculation was done by the state was that it's



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1	revenue neutral, meaning that it should not
2	escalate anyone's business license paid fees
3	paid substantially over what they're paying
4	previously. So even though they're converting
5	from a percentage to a dollar amount, and
6	they've given us a spreadsheet on the
7	calculation of our business licenses for the
8	Town of Atlantic Beach, that it will convert to
9	a dollar amount. A couple of other major
10	
	modifications and changes other than the date,
11	the fiscal year date, is that the option to
12	waive late fees for nonpayment of business
13	licenses at the annual renewal date, it is not
14	optional, and the businesses throughout the
15	state will have the ability to pay their
16	business licenses online as well as through
17	direct payments to the Town, which businesses
18	have done in the past. With the first passage
19	of the law, I thought that the County would be
20	taking over collection of all business licenses
21	that is not the case. It only allows
22	businesses throughout the state to pay their
23	business license online and it's optional. But
24	I do not or the municipality does not have

1	on November the 8th. We had three respondents,
2	Churchich, C-H-U-R-C-H-I-C-H, Recreation and
3	Design out of Beaufort, South Carolina entered
4	a bid of \$151,300 but with no taxes so we
5	couldn't compute the total value of their bid.
6	Also, they have been designated non-responsive
7	because we requested them to hold their price
8	for 90 days. They only would hold their price
9	for 30 days so they were excluded from bid
10	consideration. The second bid was Great
11	Southern Recreation out of Leland, North
12	Carolina. They submitted two bids, one for a
13	hundred and one design for \$164,583.40 and
14	a bid for \$200,080.28. They are the highest
15	bidder on both of their submittals and
16	responses. Bliss Products out of Chattanooga,
17	Tennessee submitted a bid for \$162,000 even.
18	We are recommending awarding the bid to Bliss
19	Products of Chattanooga, Tennessee. Want
20	Council and the public to be aware, the entire
21	grant was \$150,000. There are administrative
22	overhead costs that we have to pay to the
23	Waccamaw Regional which reduce that amount. We
24	are required to match the grant of \$20,000. In
25	reviewing the bid submissions, it appears that



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1	the overage in the bid amount came from the
2	fact that, in the scope of services, I included
3	perimeter fencing around the playground area
4	which approximately about 15 to \$17,000
5	added to the cost. So, all of the bids
6	exceeded the budgetary amount, but with the
7	required match that the Town is required to do
8	under the grant award, I'm asking the Town to
9	approve the \$162,000, which will require an
10	additional \$7,000 to the \$20,000 match that we
11	have to provide to have this done. The only
12	other option is to rebid them, exclude the
13	fencing, (inaudible) out the fencing separately
14	in a separate contract for the fencing. I am
15	recommending that we increase our match award
16	from \$20,000 to \$27,000 and award this bid to
17	Bliss Products. Any questions?

23	municipality. With KHAFRA's assistance and
24	having them on board and their technical
25	capability and capacity, we were able to submit



1	to the County an itemized, detailed budget
2	projecting the cost estimates for
3	infrastructure needs for the entire Town of
4	Atlantic Beach to the tune of 32 million
5	dollars. I have not heard back from the County
6	on how much of that 32 million dollar request
7	that they are going to submit in their overall
8	application for infrastructure funding just
9	approved by Congress, but I will be following
10	up. And in the past, did not have the ability
11	and the technical expertise to put together the
12	kind of financial budget estimates and
13	engineering cost assessments that are needed to
14	apply for these funds. So KHAFRA has done an
15	exceptional job in pull together and

2	noncompliance as a board, your citizens,
3	homeowners, who have flood insurance, it will
4	not help them if the Town is not in compliance
5	so that's something of a major situation to
6	(ph) consider. Bike Fest, I'm so happy to hear
7	from the Town Manager that (inaudible) consider
8	in reference to the COVID, that is a major
9	thing, COVID-19 and now the Omicron. 800,000
10	people have died from that, and we all know
11	it's still climbing so we need to be able to
12	consider (inaudible) to Bike Fest how we can,
13	you know, if the Council can look at that and
14	reconsider because it's not going down. So,
15	thank you for your time.
16	MAYOR EVANS: Thank you. Ms. Lynda Booker.
17	MS. BOOKER: Good evening.
18	COUNCILWOMAN GORE: Good evening.
19	MAYOR EVANS: Hi.
20	MS. BOOKER: Good evening, (inaudible). Ms. Booker,
21	29th Avenue South. I have a lot of things I
22	want to talk about, I'll be brief. I wanted to
23	bring you a little bit up to date on our
24	Beautification Committee. We are done with the
25	trash cans and benches, and we had some issues



1	(inaudible) in there because the ones that were
2	originally provided were damaged, they came in
3	damaged, so the company replaced them at no
4	charge to us so (inaudible) the gentlemen to
5	reinstall them. So, we're done with that.
6	We're working on the (inaudible). We decided
7	to call it Pearl Diamond (ph), and so we're
8	working on that now and hopefully, by the first
9	of the year, we'll have something to show you,
10	a rendering or something to show you as to how
11	we would like for it to look. So, we're moving
12	forward, and the snafus that we're running into
13	and I had a conversation with Mr. Q. today
14	and I do want to thank the Council, I want
15	to that Mr. Town Manager, for assisting us with
16	the trash cans and the benches and the street
17	signs. We had we have some snafus, some
18	things we need to work out. We have three
19	businesses well, we have three areas in the
20	town, one is the tire shop, the other is the
21	house on 32nd Avenue with a car sitting up on
22	the milk crates and the and then one on 31st
23	Avenue that they keep putting kitchen furniture
24	out in front of the they'll move it and then
25	they'll bring back the table and chairs. So,



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1	those seven apartments, I think Mr. Sketers
2	manages them, and they keep doing that, they'll
3	take them away and then they'll bring them
4	back. So, Mr. Q. has informed me that he
5	doesn't have anything definitive in his
6	ordinance that says they cannot do that, so I
7	asked him today if he would work with you to
8	develop a policy so that we can or just
9	modify something that we have so that the guy
10	with the tire shop will stop trashing the front
11	of the building and the back of the building.
12	There are people who live over there and those
13	people are complaining. There are people that
14	are building new dwellings over there and
15	they're complaining, and they should because,
16	first of all, he doesn't have a large dumpster
17	and he has two businesses over there, and he
18	should have a dumpster large enough to
19	accommodate the trash from both businesses.
20	But he's defiant, he'll take the card table,
21	chairs away, and the bucket seats away, and
22	then he'll bring them back after a couple of
23	weeks, he just keeps doing this over and over
24	again, so we need to we need to cleanup our
25	town. And so, we talked about that. And the



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1	other thing that we wanted to talk about was
2	we're applying for this 32 million dollars for
3	infrastructure and to put our town into the
4	21st century, and I would hate to see that
5	money come and we lose our town because
6	somebody's gonna erect 176 condos up there and
7	we can very easily just lose our charter if
8	people decide they want to vote and they will
9	outvote us. So, I would like for us to have a
10	workshop with the Planning Commission open to
11	the citizens, open to everybody, so that we can
12	go back through the Land Management Plan which
13	seldom I think a lot of people did not
14	understand how we were sitting like sitting
15	ducks for that to even happen. So, we can go
16	back through that, we don't have to modify
17	everything, we just need to modify a few things
18	to make sure that we tighten up areas so that
19	other people won't say, well, they did it,
20	they're not modifying the plan so we're gonna
21	use the same ordinance and we're gonna come in
22	and do it. And so, we need to stop that and,
23	if we're not gonna stop it with a moratorium on
24	new commercial building, we need to stop it
25	through our Planning Commission and hopefully

2	thing is, I do want to thank Mr. (inaudible)
3	for cleaning up a lot of the lots because a lot
4	of the lots have cleaned up, but we have a lot

7	MAYOR EVANS: Thank you.

21	still in the town real bad and definitely about
22	coming coming over by your house from
23	they come across there so they're all over. So
24	just be aware, they are still in the town.
