MR. BAILEY: Okay. So this year, I thought what I would provide you -- it's right there in front of the audit package -- we did a -- just a three-year kinda current year ending 6/30/2022 and then show you how '21 and '20 looked just to kinda give you an idea 'cause coming through COVID and how that may have affected your finances over the last few years and then, of course, '22 had some changes as well thought that you may get more value and then would see how all three years looked. So on that first page there -- and by the way then as far as the audit came out, we didn't have any troubles there. Ben does a good job, you know, outsource with the Town and all οf that

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(inaudible) and Cheryl there so as far as your staff, everything was fine. We had all (inaudible) so didn't have backup wetrouble as far as doing the audit itself, didn't have any major journal entries orchanges so why that's important is when you're looking at these finances throughout the year, you don't want us to come in as the auditors and make a ton of changes and then that makes the financials you look at during the year not really mean anything 'cause we've changed everything SO -but that being said, everything's in good order as far as operations on the financial side. But you'll see here, revenue is significantly higher than previous years. Of course, '20 was our first year with COVID, that last quarter, sort of shut everything down, and you can see what your revenue was, around \$750,000. Then '21, we still had a good bit -- a lot of COVID in there, and '22 is starting to get to normal. But I noticed -- you can see revenue is at \$1.4 Million. There was also another big change, if you look at the license and permits, that's mainly -- just

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you'll see that it's significantly higher than
last year, 342 versus 790. Some of that, of
course, is people businesses improving
scenario, but that's not everything, your
property I'm sorry your business license
traditionally had been July 1st through June
30th, if I remember correctly yeah, and then
the State the State changed everyone's to
May 1st through April 30th so what happened is
in '22, you were capturing some of the business
licenses right at the end of the year then you
caught some of them again towards the end of
the year because that change I know it's
sort of like we were talking at our office,
it's sort of like when you're getting paid
twice a week every once in a while that month
comes along and you get three paychecks in a
month, that's kind of what you had last year.
So, next year I would expect the business
licenses to get closer to that 350 number that
you're used to, maybe 400. So what that really
did thought is it really helped on your cash
funds, and you'll see that. So really, the
biggest changes is that huge increase in
license in the business license and the, of

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course, your all's annual Bike Fest is back -again, this being '22, they hadn't had the last two years, and that brought in 76,000. And then, of course, you can see your hospitality is -- has -- tax has improved, that -- the economy has gotten back better, and you can see back in '22 your hospitality revenue was only 36,000 so it's back up to 114,000 this year. And then when you drop down -- and if you have any questions, please stop me, I'll go over this. When you look at your expenses, were up about \$100,000 from last year, half of was the Bike Fest, it's 53,000. You didn't have any expense last year really so -because you had Bike Fest so half of that increase is that. Another portion of it is professional fees and I put some in -- details the bottom, you used а grant consultant, that was 15,000 this year to help some grant writing, and also had some additional legal costs, but in that professional fees, that's your outsourced your audit, that's accountant, that's your building inspector, judge, I think Mr. Ben is in that cost and so, when you're looking at

your expenses overall, look here at the bottom, you can see payroll and professional fees, and represents roughly 70 percent of your total expenses that the Town has every year. So some folks -- some towns we'll say, their payroll is higher because some of the people that you have under professional fees are on payroll and, in this case, you have some more 1099s, but what I was pointing out is that 70 percent, that's about what I see with small towns, small municipalities, it's about labor costs overall, consulting costs, it's about 70 percent; then you have your repairs and maintenance, utilities, insurance -- those other operating costs; and then what's over is -- you get to put into the future reserves account. So you're about where I see most towns your size, at about that 70 percent range because most of your expenses are gonna be human category. And then -- so you can see -- what I did is I broke this down revenues, expenditures and operating (inaudible) so what that's telling you is how much cash did the Town generate for operations this year. And if look '20, the iust from you in cap

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operations, the Town used up 54,000 back in '20 it's a negative 54. It got better in '21 at 81,000 and then in '22 operations is 482. again, Ι know some of that was business licenses but that doesn't go away so it really helps -- it really helps put the Town financial position little bit better which you'll see when we get to the balance sheet. And then the next section down, look at nonoperating costs, that's purchases of equipment, for instance, you purchased a couple police cars, you had some HVAC work done, bought benches, some other small equipment, and so you spent about 82,000. You did borrow some money to get the police cars, that's what that 42,000 is. And then the 12,000 is paying back some of that debt. And then down at the very bottom, that's your ARPA funds that you received, about 11,000 in ARPA funds. We have that down at the bottom just 'cause that's not your normal revenue line so you don't want to count that as your normal 'cause you'll get that once more, the other half of it, then that'll be it for those ARPA funds so -- so when it's all said and done here, your change in fund balance for

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business (inaudible) income was 541,000 this year and you can see back in '20 when COVID, we started seeing -- that was a negative 107,000 so really great improvement from '20 to '22. And if you'll flip over to the next page, just things that -that's that position (inaudible) you can see how '22 affected mainly your cash. So you can see right there in -under the 2021 column, FY2021, cash at the end of 6/30/2021 was about \$230,000 -- 230,522 -and at the end of '22, it's at \$742,000 so a significant increase and that's -- and again, that's ARPA funds in there and that's also that into the business license twice. And vou'll continue to get the business licenses, it just won't be at the same -- that 700,000, it'll be closer to 350, 400, but what it did is it sort of gave you all a little more umph. You were operating a lot slimmer in '21 than you are in '22 so this really kinda gave the Town a little more reserve than you had in the past so you can see this number at the bottom, it says 288, that's your cash on hand so that tells you based on 2022 operating expenditures, you have 288 days of cash on hand. So, we always

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suggest that number should be at least 90 days,
some towns like it to be 180 days just because
the timing, you know, for instance, you're not
gonna get that big chunk of business licenses
again until May so you're gonna be using all
the cash until you so you're gonna see your
cash balances go down you've probably have
already seen it go down some property
taxes'll help, but then the business licenses
will come later in the year so you've got to
have some operating cash because just the
timing when we collect money. So this
having a larger number helps you do some of
those tough, cash crunch times. But everything
else is pretty much the same as being some of
your accounts payables of, accounts receivables
of, that's just the timing, there's nothing
concerning there, but you will notice your fund
balance at the bottom, it was 146,000, that's
so to speak, that's your equity in the Town,
with 147,000 and then on the other (inaudible)
of those, a negative 556 so that's why it's 609
in '22, and you might say what does that do for
us? That helps you with your bank finances.
The banks don't really like to see those big

brackets down there, they like to see positive numbers when it comes to fund balances. So, if you ever had -- or you wanted -- the wanted to go after a bond or something, certainly helps bond rating and get a better interest rate so you'd want to see that number continue to improve. And then the next page, it's sort of -- it's just a general (inaudible) statement. So you've got your income statement, you've got your balance sheet, what This is kinda of a summary does it all mean? of what it all means and if you go to the middle, it says cash increase or decrease, it's all kinda (inaudible) in fiscal year '20 the Town used \$280,000 more than they brought in so those bank account decreased \$280,000 (inaudible). '21, you broke even, a little bit better, at \$2,200. And then you can see '22 is a huge bounce back adding 512. So COVID, you know, really was a -- it's pretty tough to get through the last few years, and '22, you're, I mean, you were at 510,000 in the bank at the end of fiscal year '19 before COVID and so you're -- now, you're at 743, so you're getting back -- and out of that 743, 100,000 of it's

1 ARPA money so there's certain restrictions on 2 that, how you can use those funds, so those 3 can't just be used any way you want. 4 still, overall the Town really rebounded very 5 nicely and you've had a much better financial 6 That last page was just to give you an stream. 7 idea of your -- the Town's overall salaries 8 and, as you can see, it really was very little 9 change, all of the salaries and benefits from 10 '21 to '22 went up about \$5,000, that's it. So 11 and a good part of that retirement was 12 because the retirement (inaudible) went uр 13 another 1 percent fiscal year '22 to the State. 14 So -- but overall, this was a much better year 15 than having to go through '20 and talk about 16 how much cash the Town burned through, and I 17 have those conversations a lot and -- but this 18 year, much better -- much better financial 19 condition that the Town's in. 9	approve those expenditures so when I submit the
10	request for reimbursement, I will have the
11	documentation and the approval of Council.

17	in terms of keeping the Town in compliance and
18	keeping our building construction moving so I'm
19	recommending a two-year agreement.

And on June 24th, approximately 10:00 o'clock the morning to 10:00 o'clock in the afternoon, we would like to do a festival on 30th Street to include the main street and the cul-de-sac.

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June the 25th from 10:00 a.m. 'til 10:00 'til 12:00 would like p.m., weto do beachfront church services for the Atlantic Beach. Now, all of the weekend activities will highlight the significance of the Gullah Geechee culture and the wider African diaspora. The Gullah Geechee refers to descendants of enslaved individuals who are dominantly from West Africa and who retain many of the African traditions cultures and because of their relative isolation from the rest of the world. And of course, we hold a special thing here because we were one of the communities Black beaches that were able to have reparation during this time for our people. We want to celebrate that experience. So, also in the day we want to amplify the main -- on the main stage want to have some performers and we want to have some telling the story about the Gullah Geechee culture and relating it to Atlantic Beach and we want to have musicians, we have to have a vendor market with food vendors, we want to have arts and crafts, want to get the school involved as well with their arts and we also want to recreate the punk patio style

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experience that everyone announced to t.he interviews talked about how much they enjoyed the punk patio experience. We are requesting all available Town properties on 30th Avenue, we are requesting the cul-de-sac for the main street and closure up to the 400 block on the consistent with Avenue, the location where most of the historical events have been held. We are proposing \$200 for food vendors, \$150 for all of the other vendors and will coordinate parking with (inaudible) vending space, private lot owners and most of the event would be free to -- and open to the We anticipate participants between three to 500 people, with 30 to 40 vendors. We're requesting police assistance, portapotties and an increase in trash cans. And -any questions?
