17 **New Business:**

18 **MAYOR EVANS:** We're down to New Business, and this
19 is Ordinance Number 10-2023 and this is an
20 ordinance amending the Business License
21 Ordinance of the Town of Atlantic Beach to
22 update the class schedule as required by Act
23 176 of 2020, and this will be the first
24 reading.

25 **MR. QUATTLEBAUM:** Mayor, Council and public, I'm



1 reading the basic gist of the ordinance.
2 Whereas, the Town of Atlantic Beach
3 Municipality is authorized by the South
4 Carolina Code Section 5-7-30 and Title 6,
5 Chapter 1, Article 3 would impose a business
6 license tax on gross income; and whereas, by
7 Act Number 176 of 2020 known as the South
8 Carolina Business Tax Standardization Act and
9 codified as South Carolina Code Section 6-1-400
10 to 420, the Standardization Act, the South
11 Carolina General Assembly imposed additional
12 requirements and revisions on the
13 administration of business license taxes; and
14 whereas, the Standardization Act requires that
15 by December 31st of every odd year each
16 municipality levying business license taxes
17 must adopt by ordinance the latest standardized
18 business license class schedule as recommended
19 by the Municipal Association of South Carolina
20 and adopted by the Director of Revenue and
21 Fiscal Affairs Office; whereas, following the
22 enactment of the Standardization Act, the
23 Municipality enacted Ordinance Number 1-2022 on
24 January 7, 2022 in order to comply with the
25 requirements of the Standardization Act,



1 current Business License Ordinance; and
2 whereas, the Town of Atlantic Beach
3 Municipality, the Council now wishes to amend
4 the current Business License Ordinance to adopt
5 the latest standard business license class
6 schedule as required by the Standardization Act
7 and to make other minor amendments as
8 recommended by the Association. This is the
9 first reading of a required ordinance, has to
10 be done as indicated by December 31st to keep
11 the Town in compliance. I'm requesting on the
12 adoption of the first reading that the second
13 reading be held on December the 11th at 10:00
14 a.m. at a special Council meeting so that we
15 can adopt the ordinance before the end of the
16 calendar year, December 31st. Any questions?

17 **MAYOR EVANS:** Okay, Council, seek a motion to adopt
18 Ordinance Number 10-2023 and this is the first
19 reading.

20 **COUNCILWOMAN GORE:** So moved.

1 **MAYOR EVANS:** Yea. Motion's granted.

2 **Manager's Report:**

3 **MAYOR EVANS:** We're down to the Manager's report.

4 **MR. QUATTLEBAUM:** Mayor, Council and public, I asked
5 Mr. McIver to come tonight to report on the Fun
6 Run that was held in the Town of Atlantic Beach
7 in November. He could not be in attendance and
8 he asked me to read the following events and
9 reports to the Council and to the public. I
10 wanted to thank the Council and the Town
11 Manager for recognizing me for the work I do in
12 the community serving as a Scout leader. Our
13 troop is one of the only (inaudible) black
14 troops in the country. As a youngster, I also
15 belonged to this troop so continuing this
16 legacy is important to me. I also wanted to
17 thank the supporters of the Atlantic Beach with
18 a special shout-out to Mrs. Earlene Woods, Ms.
19 Rachel Langley for their generous support
20 throughout the years, many blessings. The
21 Atlantic Beach Historical Fun Run was a
22 success, with a little more than 40 registered
23 participants, our first time hosting an event
24 like this went very well, paired with
25 cooperative weather and fun environment, the



1 participants had a great time. The course ran
2 from Oceanside of town -- of the town across
3 Highway 17, continuing back to all of the
4 streets on the east side. The Horry County
5 Police participated with special tribute to Fox
6 Gore, with his family in attendance. The run
7 benefited the American Red Cross with special
8 education information about sickle cell disease
9 in the African-American community and the needs
10 for a diverse blood donor pool. I want to
11 thank the support from Atlantic Beach Town
12 Council and staff, Atlantic Beach Police, Horry
13 County Police, Red Cross of the Eastern
14 Carolinas, our volunteers, our cowbell ringers
15 and the participants. We look forward to
16 adding this event annually to great things
17 happening in Atlantic Beach. Kenneth McIver.
18 Now, I would like to -- annually, I have our
19 Chief of Police give a report to the Council
20 and the community on crime and overview for the
21 calendar year, January 1st through December
22 2023. Chief Robinson.

23 **POLICE CHIEF ROBINSON:** I hope everybody can see
24 this. Everybody can see it pretty good?

25 **(Inaudible background noise.)**



1 **POLICE CHIEF ROBINSON:** The person that put this
2 together is my crime analyst. She's not here
3 today, she had something that she had scheduled
4 so she couldn't be here but she put this right
5 here together. It basically is the statistics
6 of all of the major incidents in the Town,
7 basically the profiling, seeing who we're
8 stopping, who we're coming into contact and
9 stuff like that. She has a lot of this stuff
10 in this short presentation so I'm going to kind
11 of do it pretty fast. If you've got any
12 questions, just stop me and I'll kind of
13 explain anything to you. This one right here
14 is -- she did the total calls from 2016 to
15 2023. As you know, we're right here in '23.
16 If you see, the peak of our calls were 2020,
17 that was around the start of the pandemic. A
18 lot of those calls, I want to say checking on
19 people and checking houses and stuff like that
20 but since then it's kind of dropped down. We
21 did pick up a little bit after 20- -- 2022 to
22 2023 in calls for service. This right here is
23 a call to serve by type, the big area right
24 here, 47 percent of our calls for services are
25 traffic stops, those are generated by officers



1 out there on Route 17 or in town making a stop
2 on a vehicle. Our next biggest one is building
3 checks, I want to say building checks is the
4 one -- let me make sure -- yeah, building
5 checks and property checks are probably all in
6 one, those are people that are on vacation, the
7 buildings that close at night or stuff like
8 that that we check on a regular -- we do call
9 them out for -- we can get statistics, stats,
10 whatever, so when we apply for different types
11 of grants, we show what kind of calls to serve
12 we have. And one of the biggest things that I
13 did notice, and this is not something that we
14 just put together, this is coming from Horry
15 County, the calls and stuff that we do that
16 come into Horry County. And what I tell a lot
17 of people, try to call Horry County 'cause all
18 this data, when we do this at the end of the
19 year, they kind of collect and we can make sure
20 that everything's accurate. One of the biggest
21 things that surprised me about -- is alcohol
22 and drug-related calls for services, we're at
23 two percent. I know once I -- when I took over
24 back in '18, the end of '18, that probably was
25 one of our biggest calls for service, and they



1 haven't gone away, you'll never get rid of
2 drugs but, by the chart, it'll show that it's
3 been condensed a whole lot, we have kind of
4 controlled it a whole lot more than back in the
5 day, especially the ones that knew what kind of
6 drugs that we were dealing with back in the
7 day, especially around 2018, '19, up in that
8 area, especially before we kind of busted Ocean
9 Apartments. So, we've kind of got that under
10 control, you'll never get rid of it, you all
11 won't see on anybody's chart anyplace, the
12 upscale community's gonna have drug issues,
13 even us, we're gonna have drug issues but I'm
14 kind of glad that we kind of got that under
15 control. Any questions about that slide?

16 **MALE SPEAKER:** The Ocean Apartments, where is that?

17 **POLICE CHIEF ROBINSON:** 31st -- it's kind of right
18 across from Evans Motel ---

19 **COUNCILWOMAN GORE:** L & J, Mr. Jim Lutz ---

20 **POLICE CHIEF ROBINSON:** Jim Lutz owned ---

21 **MALE SPEAKER:** Yeah.

22 **POLICE CHIEF ROBINSON:** Right here is public
23 contacts, this is basically every time we get
24 out with somebody, we have to -- by state law,
25 we have to report it when we make contact with



1 an individual, and they keep it to kind of see
2 if we're being biased with stopping just --
3 we're just stopping black people, just stopping
4 white people, we're just stopping women or a
5 male. In Atlantic Beach, most of our -- 43
6 percent of our public contact, we come in
7 contact with white males, 23 percent of our
8 public contacts are African-American males and
9 white females are 15 percent and black females
10 are nine percent. Others are two -- and when
11 you're talking about others, they're not
12 Hispanics, it's other nationalities that do not
13 fall under the state coding where they have the
14 state ... Any questions about that? This is
15 a breakdown of a major category, public
16 contact. Most of our stuff dealing with the
17 Police Department is public contact, when we
18 come into contact with the public. Two percent
19 of our calls are collisions that -- collisions
20 in the town but a lot of y'all say wrecks and
21 stuff, but the terminology -- well, terminology
22 -- what did ---

23 **OFFICER:** Terminology is collisions.

24 **POLICE CHIEF ROBINSON:** Collisions. Wrecks, we've
25 learned this when we went there, wrecks or an



1 accident is basically a natural cause (ph) so
2 it gets very detailed when they start talking
3 about that but collisions too. We're seeing
4 some warrants, that's basically where we have
5 to get warrants for people or warrants could be
6 anything from failure to report for court,
7 arrest warrants, anything like that and so four
8 percent. The next thing is category of
9 citations, those are the tickets that we write
10 to people from out in the -- from traffic
11 stops, or it could be just somebody trespassing
12 and violating a trespassing order and we write
13 them a ticket, or it could be a domestic
14 violence that we arrest him but, at the same
15 time, we still wrote him a ticket so that's
16 where the citation part comes. So, 29 percent
17 of our operation is citations and 65 percent of
18 it is the public contact so we come in contact
19 with the public the majority of the time while
20 we're out here which is a good thing, law
21 enforcement and the public should have good
22 contact and that's a good thing that we've got
23 65 percent public contact and only 29 percent
24 of citations. Any questions about that? Right
25 here, is just a chart of Atlantic Beach, we --



1 up in this red area right here, it's just kind
2 of a map. The Atlantic Beach Department
3 responded to 18 crashes, vehicle collisions,
4 compared to the year 2022, there were only
5 four, so we did see a kind of uptick in this
6 area right here from 18 to four in one year
7 which it is kind of -- something we might need
8 to start looking at a little bit more, I don't
9 know if we're getting more people that's
10 starting to travel a little bit more in town
11 but we jumped up basically 12 -- I mean 14 more
12 collisions this year than we had last year so
13 that's something that my traffic guys,
14 Valentine back there, will be looking into,
15 DUIs and stuff -- some of those was DUIs I
16 believe, right?

17 **OFFICER:** I don't believe a single one of the
18 collisions ---

19 **POLICE CHIEF ROBINSON:** Oh, well -- my bad. None of
20 them was DUIs. Well, that's a good thing, but
21 probably not paying attention to the people in
22 front of them. One of the things that -- some
23 of the bright lights at nighttime might be
24 causing some of these collisions so it's
25 something we are watching out for. Basic



1 profiling and excessive force. In 2023, the
2 Atlantic Beach Police Department had no
3 complaints on bias, racial profiling or
4 excessive force and, when we say no complaints,
5 that's when somebody comes in and fills out a
6 form. Just because you tell somebody, well, I
7 didn't like how that person do something or
8 something like that, it has to go on a form and
9 be reported and once it goes on a form we have
10 to investigate it in-house and we found some we
11 had to send out to the Department of Justice
12 but, as of right now, we have zero for the
13 Police Department in the past year. Over the
14 past couple years, there have been zero
15 complaints of bias or race profile so I don't
16 want somebody, you know, sometimes some people
17 tell me, well, I don't like how my officer did
18 something or did -- and I always tell them put
19 it on paper because just telling me is not
20 gonna go nowhere but once you put it on paper,
21 now we're gonna do an investigation and go from
22 there. So right now, we're at zero, racial
23 profiling complete this year. Excessive force
24 is zero, that's anything from pulling our guns
25 on somebody, have to shoot them or have to



1 fight somebody and stuff like that that might
2 be -- that we shouldn't be shooting or we
3 shouldn't be fighting, that's more when you
4 talking about excessive force. The use of
5 force incidents this year, we did have three.
6 I think it was between three and five, but
7 we're still trying to wait for some more
8 numbers to come in, but three, which that is
9 pretty good. I know we try to keep everything
10 down to zero but we do have some people that
11 just ain't gonna cooperate with the law
12 enforcement so by us just having three, that is
13 great for 365 days, you've only got three out
14 there -- out of the Police Department this
15 year. Any questions about this? Complaints,
16 they're basically the same thing, we've got a
17 total of four complaints, internal complaints.
18 Internal complaints are more internal in the
19 Police Department, when -- once those come in,
20 we do -- internal affairs decides. It's
21 something new that we started here, it's
22 something that we -- we're working in-house but
23 eventually our -- if it gets to the point, some
24 of these internal affairs, we might start going
25 outside, just to bring somebody else in to look



1 at it so we won't be biased and just -- because
2 if one of my officers does something and I feel
3 like he did it and I found him not guilty, you
4 know, then it basically goes away but I don't
5 want to be an overall judgment on that, I want
6 to bring somebody else in from another police
7 department, maybe somebody from the Council,
8 maybe somebody from the community, and have a
9 panel with them, we all look at this,
10 investigate it, what's going on in the Police
11 Department and make sure everybody's on one
12 accord and if enough votes say, well, this is
13 something serious that we might need to do
14 something with it, then we'll work it up the
15 chain but as of right now, we've got four
16 complaints and I can tell you all these four
17 complaints, just because they're internal
18 complaints don't mean they're major, some of
19 these could be -- I could tell you -- I know --
20 I think all four of them are real minor but I
21 tell my guys if they have any kind of complaint
22 put it on paper so I can investigate it and
23 make sure everybody's doing what they're
24 supposed to do. Any questions about that?
25 Vehicle pursuit, we had zero for this year and



1 that means we didn't have to chase no cars in
2 town, and that's kind of shocking, it seems
3 like we're always in a chase, but we haven't
4 chased any cars this year. Lawsuits, another
5 thing, we haven't had any lawsuits filed
6 against the Police Department this year, which
7 always is great any time -- 'cause people sue
8 the Police Department for any little thing
9 nowadays so for us having zero, that's very --
10 deadly force, another great statistic, we have
11 zero. I don't -- I think we've pulled our guns
12 out on one person this -- for the whole year so
13 we haven't got any deadly forces so that's
14 always a good number to have. All three of
15 these, by having zero, they help with our
16 insurance (inaudible) because when we're not
17 getting none of these liabilities that's --
18 that makes our premiums a little bit better
19 every year. Hopefully, it should anyway. And
20 this -- this is the end of it and she put up --
21 please visit our website. If you go on our
22 website, there's a lot of information, I
23 promise you all. Anything you want to know
24 about the Police Department, we try not to hide
25 nothing. Everything's on the website, even the



1 new policies that we're putting out, once our
2 officers read them and acknowledge that they
3 read them, we put them on the website so if one
4 officer -- they follow these policies -- you
5 all have got policies right in front of you,
6 you don't even have to ask me if he's following
7 the right policy, it's right there on the
8 website and all you've got do is go to the
9 townofatlanticbeach -- what? Go to the
10 townofatlanticbeachsc.com, click on Police;
11 when you go on the Police, it's a whole lot of
12 different categories. It tells about events
13 that we have in town, talks about court, dates
14 that the court has, it tells about the services
15 we provide, programs, the division and it talks
16 about Atlantic Beach and where we're looking at
17 -- now, where we're looking to go forward. So
18 any questions for me? Anything from Council?

19 **COUNCILWOMAN GORE:** No --

20 **POLICE CHIEF ROBINSON:** That's all I've got.

21 **COUNCILWOMAN GORE:** Thank you.

22 **(Applause.)**

23 **MR. QUATTLEBAUM:** Just one bit of information, we're
24 going to be publicizing an RFP for
25 entertainment for Bike Fest 2024, it should be



1 appearing in public notice on our website as
2 well as in the -- as required in the local
3 media for entertainment groups to provide
4 entertainment for 2024. That's all I have,
5 Mayor.

6 **MAYOR EVANS:** Okay, thank you.

7 **Public Time:**

8 **MAYOR EVANS:** We're down to Public Time, John David.

9 **MR. DAVID:** (Inaudible) the public. In a letter
10 dated 11/17/23 from Plowden Richardson --
11 Richardson Plowden, Joseph Dickey, which stated
12 that the Town of Atlantic Beach Municipal
13 Election Commission -- which is counsel,
14 Richardson Plowden, Joseph Dickey from
15 (inaudible) which was the Election Commission's
16 lawyer. It seems perplexing to me that a
17 letter dated 11/17 would say that when there
18 was no Election Commission because at the time
19 of it (inaudible) the Municipal Election
20 Commission was fired from 11/10, and they were
21 partially reinstated on 11/28 so it's most
22 perplexing that a letter from the Election
23 Commission can be submitted to the Supreme
24 Court when there was no such Election
25 Commission. So I hope that the case that we



1 have on December the 13th that's coming up for
2 the Council position that has been vacant since
3 the election in February will have no waiver or
4 conspiratorial type situation where we're not
5 properly represented because, again, we had
6 lawyers of record that submitted briefs, we had
7 lawyers of record that was supposed to provide
8 briefings during the 13th hearing and now we
9 have a lawyer that is now representing the Town
10 of Atlantic Beach Town Council that fired the
11 Election Commission and now is representing the
12 Election Commission that was fired that
13 (inaudible).

14 **MAYOR EVANS:** Thank you. Council, seek a motion to
15 adjourn.

16 **COUNCILWOMAN GORE:** So moved.

17 **MAYOR PRO TEM ISOM:** Second ---

18 **MAYOR EVANS:** Motion and a second on the floor to
19 adjourn. Roll call.

20 **CLERK:** Councilman Edward Campbell?

21 **COUNCILMAN CAMPBELL:** Yea.

22 **CLERK:** Mayor Pro Tem Josephine Isom?

23 **MAYOR PRO TEM ISOM:** Yea.
