budget was and then it shows us what the
projection was (ph), but there's nothing to
measure about how much money we actually
received between July and pick a date, March
31st, April 30th so that there's some
comparison so we can see how we are doing in
order for that calculation of what the

'24-'25 budget. My other question is that it's
my understanding that the County is doing a
reassessment of residential property values
that will be concluded by October. To the best
of my knowledge, I've never known any
reassessments to go down, and so my first
question is why is the '24-'25 property taxes
the same as the projection for '23-'24, and was
the reassessment where's the reassessment
calculated in that?

there's no increase projected for '24-'25, and
we had a much better Bike Fest, I'm assuming
that's what your report is gonna say this year
because we didn't have the rain that we had
last year. It also would be helpful if there
would be more detail about what the various
categories are and what do they mean. There's
something that says all other revenue which I'm
I don't know what that was. We had 300
we had almost \$400,000 in '22-'23, there was a
budget of 9. We are going to project to get
\$57,000, and it stayed flat but I, you know, it
would be helpful to know what that all other
revenue is.

MR. BELLAMY: Okay.

MS. CHEATHAM: I have some of the same questions regarding the personnel costs. What personnel are included in that, as well as the people who we pay that are in professional services? But those are my main questions. Thank you very much.

MR. GREEN: And Mr. Mayor, if I may add a little bit to that. To the citizen's point, one of the things that were discussed today was streamlining and reducing legal costs. In the



past years, there's been at least four law
firms who provided legal services to the Town.
Part of what I'll be doing, and my role, is
revisiting those bills, see where those bills
are in terms of reasonableness and if any costs
can be recouped, we will do that, streamlining
it will save the Town costs moving forward.
So, thank you for the question and, again, this
seems to have been an atypical year in terms of
legal costs. I'm new to this town but I've
worked with other firms and other towns so
where there's a large amount of litigation,
that's not something that should repeat itself
for years going forward so we're trying to
streamline and reduce those costs by doing a
review.

COUNCILMAN DAVID: And I know you -- this has been mentioned twice so I do want to point it out that streamlining and cost savings is great, but if we're hiring another attorney, which we're now -- I think Mr. Bellamy called him the Town's attorney -- that we're paying an attorney to look at the other attorneys, to evaluate them. So, if he saves us a whole bunch of money, great, but if not, we're paying

1	another attorney to look at three other
2	attorneys, and also paying him to investigate
3	Town citizens
4	MAYOR EVANS: We thank you. The floor is open to a
5	public hearing from the public. You come to
6	the podium please.
7	MS. CHEATHAM: (Inaudible) there's no one else.
8	MAYOR EVANS: There's no one else, nobody's
9	interested?

22	understanding that the previous Town Manager
23	was not treated as an employee but he had a
24	contract which means he would've been a

consultant. Our accountants are not employees

of the Town.

7	everything that we're looking to vote at or to
8	do on hold until we can figure out if some of
9	those past legal things were okay? So, what
10	happens if we go back and we say, oh, this was
11	probably not right and we shouldn't have done
12	this, does that change anything that's
13	happened? And I guess from a voting
14	perspective, and I'm not sure how the how
15	this works on the budget, should we be voting
16	on the budget if we still have these questions
17	that are outstanding?

what I we offered to do is to not charge for
reviewing previous invoices. So, I believe
that's very lucrative for an attorney to bill
for looking at other bills. So, number one,
there will not be any charges for reviewing
previous invoices and, number two, it will not
stop any legal work that those firms are doing
in the interim. Where there is an opportunity
for us to retrieve funds or get savings, we'll
definitely recommend that so that
recommendation's coming back in 30 days.

- MR. FERA: Okay. And then, are there still other legal firms besides you that are pursuing current activities.
- MR. BELLAMY: There's three others.

- MR. GREEN: There's three firms that were hired before I was, and so typically what happens when an attorney comes in at -- for a town to review those types of invoices, they'll review it. I'm gonna do that free of charge for the Town, and my understanding is all attorneys do. They'll continue to monitor their cases until further word from the Town (inaudible).
- MR. FERA: Okay, so they are still working their cases for Town Council?

MR. FERA: Right.

MR. GREEN: Thank goodness that they don't. So, what I'm gonna do is tell them to pause, no further billings until I've had a chance to review what their billings are, and then we'll work in a collaborative fashion to reduce expenses for the Town.

23	person to try to generate revenue for the Town.
24	One thing that I'm gonna try to do is try to
25	every municipality in the on the Grand

Strand is charging for parking. We're the only
municipality that does not charge for parking.
If you go out to the ocean right now on the
different lots, there's approximately 20 to 50
cars in a given day that we're not receiving
monies for so I hope that we can generate some
revenue. I think hopefully when the Bike Fest
report is comes back that we were able to
generate revenue on the RVs 'cause I think over
time we were charging \$10 per week for RVs to
stay here, and I think that went up to \$250, so
I hope that we generated at least 12 to \$25,000
in revenues from RVs if all the fees were
collected for Bike Fest, which is another
revenue generator. Another source of we had
franchises I think we how many
franchises? We have a Watersports down at the
ocean, right?

littlefreelibrary.org, we have access to
diverse books for our community, including
Spanish language books, and this is especially
important as we move into the summer months.
This summer, as we did in 2023, Atlantic
Beach's Little Free Library network will carry
the Horry County Public Schools' reading list
and local schools will be made aware of the
locations of our Little Free Libraries as a
place the young people can borrow their reading
books for their summer programs. Additionally,
as we are a part of the Little Free Libraries
mobile app, visitors from around the world stop
by our libraries to give books while on
vacation. Thank you to those citizens who
continue to donate books to stock our
libraries. As books are being banned across
the country, the Atlantic Beach Little Free
Libraries offer diverse books for our children
and friends to read and understand our history.
We share books that provide perspective on
racism and social justice, celebrate all
marginalized communities and incorporate
experiences from all identities for our
readers. Mr. Town Manager, thank you for your

request and your report for collecting books for the young people in our community. It is my hope that we can partner with you and your team on your collection. Thank you again.
