**OUATTLEBAUM:** MR. Mayor, Council and public, I've asked our auditor, who is now ready to be our accountant, has been our auditor for the past six or seven years and has completed the audit for fiscal year 2022 -- June, 2022 through (inaudible) -- June 1st, 2023. We've asked Mr. Bailey to come in -- come up and present this annual audit, and he's also gonna share some information terms historical in οf our financials over the past four years. Mr. Bailey?

MR. BAILEY: Hello, Mayor, Council, nice to see all of you. Mr. Quattlebaum said we needed -- we performed the June 30th, 2023 audit and we've been your auditor for several years but this will be our -- the last year as your auditor. As you know, Kim, was -- coming back in as -- came back with clients and as she left as your external accountant and were looking for

another, so we have we're not going to be
your auditor, but we're currently handling your
monthly accounting outsourced, and that's going
well. So, I'll give you an update on that
briefly after I go through the audit. But what
I have in front of you is basically in four
years, look back from 2021, '22 and '23, just
to give you an idea, you know, COVID hit in the
4th Quarter 2020, which also affected '21, so
this kind of gives you an idea of how the Town
has done coming out of COVID over the last four
years. So, this first page here is your income
and revenues and expenditures, and it's broken
down into the top part is your operating
revenues and then your operating expenditures
to generate that operating income. And as
you'll see, the Town has just over 1.3 Million
in revenues for 2023, that was down a little
bit over 2022, it was all really related to
license and permits but as you can see,
licenses and permits are up quite a bit from
'20 to '21 according because of COVID-
related issues. That's one area we're gonna
help you out and kind of look at try to
track where those, the different stores and

businesses where these business licenses were
coming from so we can kind of track who's
paying and if there's anything that seems
basically trying to find trim lines within
businesses. In case there's something that's
missing, we can help the Town sort of track
down anyone that maybe is not paying those kind
of things so we're gonna help you with that on
the accounting side of things. But overall,
most everything else property taxes is up
slightly, franchise fees up slightly,
hospitality accommodations up about 20 or
30,000 there. So overall, like I said, 1.3
Million in revenue, about 1.2 Million in
expenditures. That was up from last year on
various things. Salary and benefits was up,
some of that was wages and some of that was
increases in health insurance, retirement,
those items. Also, professional fees were up
a little bit. Some of that was on legal, some
of it was grant writing and planning costs.
What you'll see down at the bottom, you'll see
payroll and professional fees. You'll see
payroll is about 45 percent of your total
expenditures and professional fees is about 20

percent so combined that's roughly 66 percent
with those two items. That's kind of what we
see with a lot small towns, meaning either you
have more on-staff payroll that increases and
we have less outsourced, but roughly around
that $65-70$ percent is what we see with
outsourced and payroll so you're kind of right
there in what we see with a lot of other small
towns that we're auditing. You also had some
increased repairs and maintenance this past
year and a lot of various equipment repairs.
And then, you can see right there, your
operating income of \$100,000 so what that says
is after you've paid all of your operating
expenditures, you had \$100,000 left over to
invest in capital assets, to pay down debt
service and also to put some in into
reserves for future periods. This past year,
you were able to with some of your grant
writing, you were able to obtain some
additional grants and you'll see that
government grant number, \$264,000 there and
a lot of that all those grants, or its
funds, allow the capital outlay that you see
there at \$290,000. And just a reminder, you

know, you had a playground, about \$162,000 in
playground equipment, some improvements to your
Community Center, HVAC and security, bought
some new vehicles so that's the bulk of the
\$290,000 that you spent this year in capital
outlay. So overall, your change in fund
balance this year was \$172,000, which was down
from last year but much higher than '20 and '21
as you see when you're going across. And then
that last section there, it just shows you
where the categories of where the Town's
spending money. As I said, payroll's your
biggest expense that's right at 45 percent
then professional services, and then it
drops down to utilities, about 7 percent, and
repairs and maintenance is about 6 percent so
those four categories are about 78 percent of
every dollar spent here in the town. The next
page will show you the balance sheet. And
you'll see the first line there, the cash, cash
has increased. Like a lot of towns, again,
coming out of COVID, there was a lot of federal
dollars that came in. COVID-related dollars
are the dollars that's come in and helped cash
flow, a lot of towns and you also benefited

that. So, you can see you're at about \$868,000
in unrestricted cash at the end of fiscal year
'23. Most everything else in your balance
sheet is very consistent. You'll see the
capital assets did increase I went through
the park and the vehicles and the Community
Center increases that account. Looking across
there, your you don't have much in accounts
payable, about \$50,000, that's just your normal
course of business. Payables there, and then
your other liabilities here. You'll see
just a reminder that pension number,
\$578,000, that's the PEBA and, as you know, the
State Retirement is underfunded and so every
participant, every town and county,
municipality, that's in the State Retirement
gets a portion of that deficit allocated to you
so that's given to you out of Columbia, and
it's increased a little bit from last year.
And then you have a little bit of debt from the
lease on a vehicle that's being paid down each
year, it's down to \$18,000. Overall, you have
a positive fund overall fund balance of
\$948,000. The unassigned number is a negative
\$15,000 but it has improved over the last few

years. So overall, I'd say the Town has has
done a good job coming out of COVID and trying
to balance your spending and go after some
federal dollars to come up with capital outlay
such as your park and Community Center. That's
and that's we've got a lot of towns where
you we have enough to fund your operations
but when you really want to go out and improve
some areas in a town, typically you're going
after grants for that type of expenditure
because, as you know, with inflation and the
cost of everything, those things are very, very
expensive to and like \$162,000 for
playground equipment. So overall like I
said, overall the Town has had a good year and
it's coming it's done well coming out of
COVID over the last four years. So, now we've
transitioned from the audit as your auditor
to your accountant and we've made some changes
there of qualifying a CPA in our office, be
working with Darrel. And there's a few things
that we've done, some things we've done to help
the flow of funds; for instance, we're paying
bills weekly. So, the way that process works
is Ms. Cheryl sends up the invoices, we don't

have any signing authority on any of t	he
accounts, we put those into the system and ea	.ch
week we will submit those back to M	Ir.
Quattlebaum and he will approve them a	nd
payments go out to make sure there's no miss	ed
payments. We're also going to be taking up	
what you'll eventually get is we're going	to
just transition and you'll get month	.1y
financial statements from our firm and Pa	ul
includes a video that kind of goes over, y	ou
know, what's happening month to month. You'	11
get it by e-mail so it's really easy, and th	.en
he'll come down once a quarter as well to ta	.1 k

transition, we're trying to sort of automa	te

But overall, this audit went well. Basicall	У,

purchases under the American Rescue Plan, those
kinds of expenses, or expenditures, funds can
be used for primarily are security
enhancements. However, the (inaudible)
improvements to the community and we, the Town
of Atlantic Beach, received two allocations
totaling two hundred I think and two dollars in
two separate awards over two cycles.
Previously, we utilized \$64,000 approved by the
Council to pay for various improvements in our
Police Department, security at Town Hall and a
number of other security enhancements to the
Town of Atlantic Beach. That was 2022. At
this time, I'm asking for the utilization and
the transfer of \$58,000 of American Rescue Plan
funds back to the General account to pay for
radio services for our Police Department. The
total cost I think in your packets is about
\$20,000. If you recall, the Town received a
\$5,000 donation and contribution specifically
tailored for radio services so 15 of that
\$58,000 are for the police radios that the
Police Department has received and are
utilizing. The other \$42,000 is obviously

being request to use funds for the payment of 1 2 the -- vehicles that we financed three years 3 ago, \$42,000 for the vehicles, and to reimburse 4 the General Fund for those payments that were 5 made for those vehicles, totally \$58,000. The 6 main reason I've requested is that, again, the 7 American Rescue Funds are restricted. This 8 will reimburse the General Fund and allow us 9 the flexibility to use those funds to support other improvements in 10 the Town of Atlantic Any questions? 11 Beach.

# Manager's Report

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MAYOR EVANS: We're down to the Manager's Report.

3 MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Mayor and Council and public, I am pleased to announce that the Town of Atlantic 5 Beach has submitted its second RAISE Grant, \$22 6 Million Dollars for maior infrastructure the Town of Atlantic 7 improvement throughout 8 I would like to commend Ms. Beach. Denise 9 Gibson Bailey, Ms. Cheatham, for their 10 diligence and working tirelessly to get this 11 application submitted on February the 12 Our last submission last year, wе had 13 participated in assessment and valuation of our 14 original application which scored very well but 15 the Grant nationally is highly competitive. We're competing with municipalities across the 16 17 country. I can't remember exactly but I think 18 it's over a thousand applicants for the funding 19 that's available. But pending the evaluation 20 we received from the funders is that the Town 21 scored very well in the first five major 22 with categories and just some slight 23 improvements in three other categories which 24 this application, Ms. Bailey and Ms. Cheatham 25 made focus on trying to improve our submission.

Again, it is very highly competitive with 22
Million Dollars of infrastructure improvements
and burying power lines, upgrades on the
sidewalks, roads, you name it, in the town.
So, I just wanted to commend them and thank
them for their efforts and support and
submission of the RAISE Grant application.
Also like to thank all of the residents,
public, who participated and provided comments
on February 29th for the SCDOT sidewalk
proposal to be installed in the Town of
Atlantic Beach and medians. The comments were
well received and the input in terms of what we
would like to see, those proposed South
Carolina DOT improvements along Highway 17. I
would like to encourage all of our vendors
or property owners who plan to lease their
property for Bike Fest to submit online, if you
want to be a property owner to allow someone to
lease your property for Bike Fest, you have to
complete an application that is online so that
Cheryl will know that when people are requiring
or looking for spots and locations to vend
during Bike Fest, you must be on that list so
that's the only we can get referrals to you as

individuals. Please complete that information
we will know whether you want to participate
this year. Even though if you've done it in
the past, we're asking you to refile every year
that you intend and would like to have your
site for that purpose. Along that line also,
I encourage everyone, property owners who do
lease their property and if there is need for
electrical power poles to be installed, please
start as early as possible getting that done so
that we're not the week of Bike Fest trying to
get approvals. All power, electrical poles,
have to be approved in advanced, inspected by
either an engineer, licensed engineer, or a
building inspector before Santee Cooper will
supply power so we need to start that process
as early as possible so that the week of Bike
Fest we're not scurrying around trying to get
power and access done. So, I encourage all of
you who want to participate in leasing your
property get that done. Last thing, a reminder
that business license renewals start April
30th. There's an online portal that is
available. We don't have as Mr. Bailey
indicated, Kim sometimes they wanted

manually processing business licenses.
encourage all of you for efficiency in the
process to utilize the online portal. If it is
not on the website now, we will add it, but
there is a process where you can go online and
submit all of your appropriate documentation by
April 30th to submit. It has been open since
January. You can start the process of renewal
or get started as early as January, but has
to be completed by April 30th, 2024. Any
