If this is not being done, then we have a process where -where we are right now, because I can't find anywhere in the Town's finances where we ever charged for a permit to do construction, they're on our books and they're outdated. So, what we're going to do is we're going to start having permit fees for plumbing, rough in, any construction that is done, electrical. This is what every municipality does. This is not new to Atlantic Beach. And so what we're doing is we're simply updating the fees associated with that. It approximately cost the town \$150 for a consultant to come out and perform these services, because don't. wefinancially have our own building inspectors.

- So, we're asking to add the price to go up on those inspections so that the Town won't be the -- taking the brunt of the of that cost.
 - MR. DAVID: What is the current fee in the last ordinance?
- 6 MR. JONES: The current fee in the last ordinance 7 is \$75 and the consultant charges us 150 to 8 come out.
