- 22 | COMMUNITY REPORT:
- 23 MR. BOOKER: Mayor Pro Tem and Council and Town
- 24 Manager and Clerk, Community, good evening.
- I'd like to talk a bit about the some of the

I'd

1	things that are going on in the community. I'd
2	like to talk about some of the activities that
3	are going on in the community, one of which
4	the first one of which I hope by now you would
5	have seen, and it's under the category of
6	beautification. We've we've been putting
7	forth a lot of effort in beautifying the town
8	with some of the palm trees being carved up to
9	look like palm trees and some of the edging and
10	some of the brush growing on the sidewalks,
11	grass being cut. And we expect to continue to
12	continue to improve upon the appearance of
13	the Town. We have a staff that's focused on
14	that. At the same time we're also saving costs
15	because when we about a year ago we were
16	paying \$1500 dollars each time someone cuts the
17	grass. And then we went out for bids and we
18	got we got it reduced to \$900 dollars each
19	time someone cuts the grass. And now we have
20	a staff that's cutting the grass as part of
21	their normal job, in addition to doing all the
22	other beautification incentives that are going
23	on. So in addition to saving money it went
24	out for some reason I'll talk loud. In
25	addition to saving money, we're beautifying the

town. So I hope you've noticed noticed that
that's taking place. Thank you. I hope you've
noticed that that beautification work in going
on. We expect it to continue. And under the
area of beautification as well, we were
notified that the water at 30th Avenue cul-da-
sac had an issue, the showers weren't working.
So I spoke with the Water Sports operator, Mr.
Zimmerman, and he that's a part of his
contract to provide water for the cul-da-sac.
He had someone to go down today and he's gonna
get that fixed immediately. So that's gonna be
taken care of. Under the area of community
engagement, which is a part of my job title, I
have some things that I'm working on and I have
enlisted the help of one of the citizens who's
volunteering with us, Ms. Erica Vonn (ph), in
addition to the staff, Carnisha and Cheryl.
And we'll all be working to and Destiny,
we'll be working to create quite a few
community activities here in this community
center. Within a couple of weeks we expect to
kick off with a harvest week, a set of
activities which will include a movie night,
bingo, and a kids trick-or-treat initiative

with the help of the police force. In addition
to that we're gonna have regular computer
assistance for people who need computer
assistance. We have computers that came by way
of the Economic Development Workshop that the
Mayor Pro Tem led. So we're gonna put those to
use and we'll have Destiny available a couple
of times a week, usually on Tuesday and
Thursday. We'll let you know about the hours
to help people improve their develop
computer skills and improve their computer
skills to do the kinds of things that you need
to do with computers, whether it's apply for
services or look for services, whatever people
need to do with computers, you know, that's
that's becoming the normal. You either go into
the place or you do it by computer. And often
times many people can't go into the facility so
we're gonna try to assist with that here in the
community center. In addition we expect to
have workshops for the people who need help.
One for seniors, focused on things like
healthcare, healthcare insurance, you know,
when people get on Medicare and have to get
supplements, that's not it is a complicated

process. And any any support we can give to
people to understand that so that they can make
good choices with healthcare. And we've had
we're gonna look into getting some of the
healthcare providers to come and talk to some
of our citizens on various healthcare issues
and things such as that as a part of our
initiative, our community initiative. So
that's what you can look forward to that.
We'll be putting out schedules for these events
and communicating it through by way of the
website and communication in the community and
other vehicles, Facebook, and so forth, so that
we'll try to get our attendance so that we can
provide that service to our citizens and other
neighbors as well. So that's that under that
prompt, under that subject. The next subject
I'd like to talk about is the Solar Project.
I hope you all know by now we have a Solar
Project that's being installed and it's because
of circumstances it's not gonna be installed on
30th Avenue. It's gonna be installed on Ocean
Boulevard. The initial plan was to put it all
along 30th Avenue, but because of some
requirements we could not get enough materials

with the cost of the project to get it all the
way down 30th. So the decision was made to
cover all of Ocean Boulevard. So that project
is moving along. It's scheduled to be
completed by the end of October. But as a
result of some equipment delay delivery
issues, it appears that the poles and some of
the fixtures for the poles aren't gonna arrive
until about mid-October. So that gives them
two weeks to get them in before the forecasted
project end date. And two weeks is kind of
aggressive. So it appears that we may not make
October 31st, but it'll be shortly thereafter.
As we move along the project team will will
plan out what we can do with based on the
expected delivery date and then we'll likely
have to make a request for an extension of a
few days, not a lengthy amount of time. In
terms of project costs and the finances
associated with it, the project was for
\$488,840 dollars. So that's the total project
value. So far we've allo committed
\$360,428 dollars to Bay Electric. We are
we've thus far spent \$78,525 dollars for
(inaudible) for the engineering and the

1	administration of the project. And we've spend
2	\$48,000 dollars for the electric vehicle
3	charging station. And so as a result we've
4	spent or allocated \$486,952 dollars of the
5	\$488,840, which leaves \$1888 left over for
6	other administrative duties and so forth,
7	things such as that. There is an area which
8	may add costs that has not been forecasted in
9	the project that has to do with Spectrum,
10	because these solar lighting systems are gonna
11	have cameras on them as well. And so we'll
12	need to work through Spectrum to get the
13	cameras showing on a screen or however you want
14	to use the cameras. And it's somewhat unclear
15	right now what Spectrum costs are gonna be.
16	They may be significant and they may be
17	insignificant. It depends on what needs to
18	happen in order to make that connection between
19	the cameras, which are gonna be on Ocean
20	Boulevard and the screen, which are gonna be
21	here for the police. There is some potential
22	that we may have to add poles, 13 or so poles
23	to get that signal from there to here, or it
24	may be as simple as using an IP address, which
25	all of this is over my head. But I'm just

it's just, you know, through some data system
that they can connect. So that's that has
to be cleared up. Hopefully it's the latter,
where it's just a simple data connection and we
won't incur significant costs. But I just
wanted to make you aware that there's a
potential for that. So right now for what
we're looking at, money, we're \$1888 dollars
left over \$1888 dollars left over after we
dedicate all this project money and these
contracts and all that.

- MR. DAVID: Mr. Booker, will you point that that is a Horry County offer grant that is fully reimbursable?
- MR. BOOKER: I didn't say that, but yes it is. It's fully reimbursable. Thank you.

same time that they're doing 30th. And he said

get that through the CTC that we'll try to get
it all done on one fell swoop, under that
contract price. So I'll be continuing to work
and try to make that happen. Last couple of
things, comprehensive plan, that work
continues, and there's a focus group for
business leaders this Wednesday coming up at
5:00 p.m. here in the community center. So the

MR. JONES: Good evening, Council, Mayor Pro Tem, and Citizens. It's kind of hard to follow Mr. He made my job a little hard for me tonight, so I'ma do my best. I want to start out by giving updates. First I'm gonna address staffing hires, resignations and disciplinary matters. The Recreation Department, which was formerly known as the Public Works Department is of no more. It's -- I'm pretty sure most of you pretty much know, so we hired a new guy and some of the things he's been doing you can see some of the changes of him keeping the grass cut, the right of ways cut, clearing the -keeping the cul-da-sacs clean, and sidewalks So he's doing an and stuff of that nature. excellent job. We also hired a front desk clerk to help us with welcoming visitors, working with the police department, answering calls, stuff of that nature, to assist her with some of the clerical stuff that we have going on in Town Hall as well. We also address key policy issues. So I want to go through some

1	policy and procedures. I'ma start with the
2	permitting process. For over a decade, the
3	Town permitting process has failed us
4	tremendously, both financially and economically
5	and a lot of other ways. The person that we
6	had in charge of doing our permits, the Town
7	generated zero funds from that when it came to
8	construction or any process that requires a
9	permit. A lot of people thought that when I
10	started to enforce this that it was a new thing
11	or I came in and I'm trying to enforce
12	something that wasn't on the book. As a matter
13	of fact, this stuff was on the books since the
14	late 80s. I it behooves me that we had an
15	administration or a police department or a
16	person sitting in my chair that didn't enforce
17	the town land management ordinances, or didn't
18	enforce the things that are just plain sight
19	stuff. So part of my administration has been
20	getting those things in order. Not
21	implementing anything but just enforcing, just
22	implementing what's already on the books. I
23	know technically, you know, I can't talk
24	(inaudible) but I can say that this since
25	we've started doing the permits, since we've

started facilitating the permit system, we have
not only cut down on time frames, what it takes
for people to get permits, to get their
inspections done for the builders or the
contractors that are doing things, they went
from two and three weeks to maybe a day, day
and a half. We are we are moving things
along. The permitting process has started to
generate a revenue that the Town didn't even
know it had. And so these are things that have
been key. Also, let me talk about the
procurement process. The Town had little to no
procurement process when it comes to the
purchasing, acquiring supplies, construction
tracking, any data driven processes and
procedures were not just in place. There was
no way for us to know or to keep an accurate
account on who was paying, who was not paying.
You know, there were people that were that
were simply ravishing the Town. And we had no
way of being able to keep up with that. And
that's just because a lot of the purchasing
processes and procedures, our bookkeeping, our
score keeping, all of the things that a
municipality needs to make work, weren't just

being adhered to. I mean these are simple
functional things. These are not big things
that I come in and change. I don't want
anybody to leave inclined with the idea that
the things that are occurring are changes or
someone implementing something new. You just
you just have not been given the service
that you deserve. I am providing that now.
Also, I want to address the Business Licence
Ordinance. The process of the Business Licence
Ordinance that the Town adopted, we need to get
our business licences, we need to get into
conformed (inaudible) and I've talked to
Council about it. We all understand. We have
a December 31st deadline to get our to get
in compliance with our Business License, so
that's something that we need to get into to
make a priority and I'm pretty sure that
Council is on board with me to making sure that
that happens pretty soon. Our leave policy and
enforcement, the Town continues to enforce our
procedures requesting to paid time off as sick
leave. Usually anybody who work for the Town,
you just call a couple hours before you're
supposed to be at work, you didn't have file

any paperwork, you didn't have to do anything
pretty much. You send an email or you can send
a text that said, hey, I'm not coming to work
today. And it was a lot. I don't understand
why but this is some of the things that will
not be tolerated under this new administration.
Documents and digitalization is something that
I'm working with. We are now moving forward
with taking all of the Town's historical
documents and digitizing them, putting them in
the cloud so that we eliminate the risk that we
currently have for something happening to the
Town Hall and we lose all the data that we
currently have. So that is one of the tasks
that I have Destiny and Carnisha working on
daily, scanning in those file systems, putting
in on digital a roadmap so that we can have
those things readily. And another ordinance
that I want to bring to the Town's attention
and to Council's attention is the ordinance
books for the police departments, because
currently the police departments operate out of
a system where they write tickets and the Town
gets about two pennies off of everything that
they write. That's because there has been some

1	type of failure in the leadership where the
2	there we haven't created, or we have not
3	enforced the wherewithal, or implemented to
4	process of us getting our own ordinance book,
5	meaning that the Town has been getting past
6	should have it's own ordinance book in which it
7	writes tickets out of so the Town can benefit
8	from that. Not Horry County, not the State of
9	South Carolina. They all get a piece of it,
10	but right now we're on the back end of our own
11	ticket writing and that's a simple fix. These
12	are simple fixes that I'm addressing right now.
13	This is not nothing that needs a legislating
14	change or needs some kind of overhaul of the
15	system. The wheel does not need reinventing.
16	It's already in place. Atlantic Beach has been
17	here for 90 years and I'm sure it's gonna be
18	here for another 90, once we smooth things out.
19	Training and development for professional
20	development, the Town has been actively
21	supporting staff, development and
22	certifications. Our assistant Town Clerk,
23	Carnisha, is currently pursuing certifications
24	through the Municipal Association of South
25	Carolina. She has attended the 2025 South

Carolina Municipal Clerks and Treasurers
Institute, year one, session A, as well as
Small City Summit. Additionally me, myself,
and Town Clerk Assistant Town Clerk,
Carnisha, are scheduled to attend the 2025
Managers and Administrative Forum on October
the 16th, 2025. I think that's in Charleston
is it? Charleston? Okay. And finally I want
to give you a brief summary of the revenue and
expenditures comparative. I gave you all a
list of those. Mayor Pro Tem, I will adhere to
your request and make sure we break those down
in monthly increments so you can see month by
month how the expenditures have been allocated.
And any other adjustment that you want to see
from me pertaining to that. I also want to get
to grants and funding. The status of grants
awarded, as you may have heard, we have the
Santee Cooper Grant application that's out and
we are following up with them on some stuff
that they have allocated. The police
department was awarded \$30k plus for grants for
body cameras and radios, stuff of that nature
that they were awarded just this last week. So
that's a big help to our police department. I

would like to give kudos to them for their
for their for pursuing these grants because
they are work diligent daily to to keep
us breast with the things that they need. And
I think we need to give them a hand on that
because they're working pretty tough
(inaudible) there chasing daily for the things
that we just don't have the resources for them
to get and that's unfortunate. Community
events and engagements, as Mr. Booker said, I'm
gonna regurgitate a bit after him. We we
want to start to make the community center more
active. We need some activity over here. And,
you know, we want to have some bingo nights.
We want to have some Friday night movie nights,
popcorn, things that we can provide citizens to
come in. We also want to pursue avenues of, as
Mr. Booker stated earlier, of helping our
senior citizens when it comes to, you know,
filling doing medicare stuff. You know,
they might not have no one at home with them
that can help them. Santee Cooper has I'm
talking with Santee Cooper because they have a
program in place that I I'm trying to get
work in conjunction with them to come to the

Town to come to the community center so they
can help us with the economic grants that they
have pertaining to people that need their house
winterized. You know, some not everybody in
the community get to benefit from a weatherized
home. You know, some of these houses need to
be weatherized. They need windows, doors
replacement, anything that we can do to assist
them to get funding from Santee Cooper, we
should be assisting them. We have to we
have to do better of taking care of everybody
in the town. And that's some of the things
that I personally take dearly to the heart. I
love our beach front. I know the beach front
is our attraction but we have a whole other
side of the town that we need to put our focus
on as well because this is an entire town, not
not just the beach front. You know, we
we have to when we're looking at projects
and things that we're chasing to beautify, we
have to beautify as as holistically as we
possibly can because I want to address that,
you know, riding through the town is like
riding through a box of crayons. You know,
there's colors everywhere, and we need to

become more uniform as a town on the look of
our 17th Street. We need to legislation
together that's going to make us not look like
you're in a reggae town. When you look at the
face of our town, we have to address that.
People have storage containers everywhere.
They're unloading all up and down the front of
the street that some of these if you go up
and bust a left right now, they have trash
businesses have trash everywhere. We have to
do better. These are the things that we need
to be focused on. I understand that everybody
likes pretty pictures and having a party but
there's other legislation that we need to be
addressing in the town. Some of the key
priorities I have for the look ahead for the
next 30 to 60 days is the town will directly
focus on the look of our face of 17th. The
administration is gonna be focusing on
uniforming and speaking with building zone so
we can collaboratively enforce the town
ordinances when it come to stuff like signage
we have ordinance that state whether you're
a business or not a business, 25 percent of
your window can't be covered up. That's in the

ordinance. Anybody who wants to see it, I'll
be glad to show you. But we have businesses
that have whole signs in their whole they
take up their whole window. That's a
violation. We got containers all throughout
the town. That's a violation. These are
ordinances that were written way before I got
here. These are things these are the basic
things that we need to get back to the basics
of making Atlantic Beach a not only a place
where there, you can come and there are things
to a good time to be had, but we want to be
liveable, inhabitable, and we want the
aesthetics of it welcoming and warm. We want
it to be we want it to look like we feel
about it. And to do that we have to start
working on the legislative part of things and
making sure that everybody, not just some of
us, but everybody come into compliance with the
ordinance that the town has fit, because these
ordinances are not designed to target anyone.
They're really basically designed to keep the
town beautiful. They're really basically
designed to make sure that we are uniform in
the way we look and we're attracting that I'm

sure council wants to attract when it comes to businesses, home ownership, and development.

So if you guys have any questions I will gladly address it.

MR. DAVID: Yeah, you wanna go first?

MS. TAYLOR: No. I don't have any.

look at Atlantic Beach, we look like we belong
in the country somewhere. It doesn't look
it's not a good look. And what I would like to
ask is is there is it possible that we
can create an ordinance that will prohibit any
more car dealerships on the front of our town
or anything that's not going to be attractive?
And we also had an owner on one of the
properties on 17 who wanted to put a drug rehab
place there, which would have taken us down.
And we had to fight to keep that from coming
in. A gentleman owned property and he wanted
to put a facility that he was calling a medical
facility but it was going to be the people who
are going through rehab, who had just come
through and get their drugs and then where they
come sort of perch themselves afterwards,
they're gonna perch themselves on the beach.
And I would just like for us to be able to get
some type of protection in place, some type of
an ordinance in place that will give specific
directions on what can not go there, what can

thing is, we have some places in town, and

we're talking about beautification, we have
some places in town where the places are fine
but they have put living room furniture out in
front of in the front yards. And you have
people here with 31st Avenue for example,
looks beautiful. That's where your family is,
Titus. (Inaudible) Earl and your brother, they
keep it beautiful. But then you go up the
street and you have these places that have
leather sofas on the front and I think that's
unacceptable. So I'm just asking, can we come
up with some kind of an ordinance that would
say we're not gonna accept car dealerships all
across the front of the town and that we can
put some controls on what people put outside of
the properties?

- MR. DAVID: Adrian, could you speak to that?

 Because we had that in one of the ordinances that didn't get done ---

- MR. DAVID: --- and was supposed to be integrated into something.
