MALE SPEAKER: No. So, we took it to Black's -- we took it to two -- two different mechanics -- mechanic shops to look at the black Tahoe, and they said it needed a new motor repair, and it was going to cost over \$10,000. So, we ended up taking it back here to Honest Tom, and they say you don't need a new engine. You need a new manifold, you need -- you're gonna need new brakes, and you need new tires, 'cause they're -- they're thick. So, they did that work, and they were -- they were able to repair it for about, I think it was 2800.

COUNCILMAN: Well, we can start going to Honest Tom's instead of Black's.

(Laughter)

MALE SPEAKER: Yeah, that was something we were discussing, as well. Which is -- yeah, that

1 was something we're discussing, yeah.

COUNCILMAN: And let's do -- let's try to get a tracking system that you can report to the Town Manager for the different things we've talked about. And let's seek to not spend \$50,000 on a new -- on four cars -- six cars getting repaired. Let's try to see if we maybe can get a new car this year and do less repairs on the other cars.

2		cameras, tasers, in-car computers, in-car
3		radios, and fire arms. That's at the bottom of
4		that paper. Now, some grants require ten
5		percent match if approved, and that breakdown
6		is at the bottom. And some pay the whole
7		thing. And we're trying to do the highway
8		safety grant to be able to get the body and
9		dashcam. They pay up to \$10,000 in
10		reimbursement for law enforcement networking,
11		which is to be able so, every year they hold
12		this luncheon in Columbia, and they give out a
13		brand new car; they give out Lidars; and they
14		give out other equipment for anybody that
15		attends this percentage, like if you're a gold
16		member, you attended 100 percent of the
17		meetings and the checkpoint, whenever they have
18		one, the 50 percent, so, you're the more
19		percent the higher percentage you attend
20		these events, the more you have to win a car.
21		So, that grant reimburses up to ten percent of
22		overtime or pay that (inaudible) that
23		investment.
