- 3 work for the MS. HUYLER: So I South Carolina 4 Forestry Commission. I'm the Urban Forestry 5 Specialist for the Pee Dee region. So we work 6 strictly in municipalities, towns and cities 7 with city trees on it. So we assist the Arbor 8 Day Foundation for their Tree City awards, but they are a nationwide program, if not global. 9
- 10 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Make sure you talk into the microphone.
- MS. HUYLER: Oh, sorry. I wasn't wanting to turn my back to you though. I guess I'm supposed to.
- MR. DAVID: You can pick it up and grab -- you can hold it.
- 16 | MS. HUYLER: Oh, Lord. Now you are risking a lot.
- 17 MR. DAVID: Or we can turn that around.
- MS. HUYLER: Okay. I will try not to cause damage.

 So I'm with the Forestry Commission. I work

 for City Trees. And -- oh good, that's much

 better. I just don't want to turn my back on
- 22 somebody and talk. As with the Forestry
- Commission, your city trees, we expect your
- 24 trees to do work for you. They are part of
- your infrastructure. And they are some of the

longest lived residents in your town. They
often live long past renters, homeowners move
in and out, new developers come in and the
trees are still there. So we expect the trees
to do work. Benefits outweigh the costs, just
like you expect your streets, your storm
drains, your electric lights, all of that.
Benefits outweigh the costs. So what we
provide every year with the Forestry Commission
is Urban Forestry Grants. We offer them in the
fall. There will be a webinar about what
grants we can offer. We get all of our grant
money from the Forest Service. The Forest
Service gets all of their grant money from the
Feds. This year might be a little tighter than
usual, but South Carolina has been backing us.
So, this is a flier from 2023 for Urban
Forestry Grants when we were very flush with
money. On the back details all the grants we
can offer when we are flush with money. Right
now I think what we can offer are the Technical
Assistance Community Grants. So we would not
be able to offer the last two as of this
moment. I don't know if anything changes. So
what I wanted to say, because I know you guys

are busy, you've got a lot of stuff going on
and trees can be a little extra. The first
four grants, the tree canopy cover, education
campaign, the ecosystem services and the tree
codes audit, if you want those and your apply
for the them and get them, it's free to you.
You don't have to pony up a penny. There's no
personnel that does the work. All of that
money goes to a nonprofit agency called the
Green Infrastructure Center. They've been
working with the Forest Commission for years.
They will do the work, provide you the results.
So these are the four easiest grants time-wise
and money-wise for cities to get. And I'll
just briefly mention the tree canopy cover,
that will literally give you a map. And you
have a GIS system. You'll have this map for
forever of the entire canopy of your the
boundaries of Atlantic Beach, tax paying
district of it. They use USDA aerial and
satellite data to create it. They'll give you
an average percent canopy cover, 26 percent, 32
percent, and they'll give you what looks like
plantable areas. They can tell the difference
between a baseball field and regular land, but

if you have any sort of farming in this area,
they won't be able to determine that. But
they'll give you plantable areas. They can
discern that. This would be the base map for
Atlantic Beach. You got this map, in ten years
you could see changes, 20 years, 30 years. You
can see where trees have disappeared, trees
have grown up and your average percent cover
will change. Briar Cliff Acres just got theirs
the other year on that because they are working
to keep people from moving in and just clear
cutting everything down, putting up a few palm
trees, crepe myrtles and that's it. You know
this. They are trying to retain that canopy
cover on it. It provides great shade, it
screens US-17, the pollution, the noise, the
heat, all of that. It provides playgrounds
with shade, like you've got out there. People
walk, people actually drive to Briar Cliff
Acres with their bicycles so they can ride
around the shady streets. So when we say trees
do work, they do. Right now shade is a main
thing. Most you got about nine months of
summer here. Where people park, if you want to
get them to park outside your business, it's

nice to have a tree. That's what they aim for,
is that shade. You want them to come out,
shade is it. They also pull storm water out of
the ground. When it rains, it's your trees
that's doing it, it's not your turf grass.
It's not. So it helps with reducing the amount
of water that's ponding on your roads, going
into your yards, right? Trees are fantastic
pumps pulling water out of the ground. Most of
the cities here have public and private
ordinances, tree ordinances, trying to keep
trees in the city. For most cities private
property makes up the vast majority of a town.
Briar Cliff Acres just has a Town Hall. Most
small towns, that's all they've got, the rest
is private. So many of the cities here have
private tree ordinances trying to keep enough
trees in there to provide the benefits. A few
trees on your public land isn't gonna do
diddly. May be able to park under it, but
you're gonna have flooding.

MR. DAVID: Do you do anything in regards to -- I know we have trees that are in the dunes or bushes, are those considered trees or is there any of the tree grants that can be used for the

MR. DAVID: Yeah.

MS. HUYLER: Yeah. We could -- we do have a tree planting grant. That is one of those that you would get the grant directly from us.

MR. DAVID: Okay.

MS. HUYLER: You would do the work. We would pay you back 80 percent of your project costs.

MR. DAVID: Okay. But it could -- it could be in the dunes and such.

Yeah. And that's one way to keep you having beach dunes. That keeps storm water from crashing up through, is having dunes there to get -- absorb the impact of the waves.

MS. HUYLER: So, yeah. So those first four that I mentioned are with the Green Infrastructure Center. The rest, everything down from storm mitigation to the Green Infrastructure Plan, those the grants would be with the Forestry Commission. The work would be done here,

MS. **HUYLER:** How do you design your parking lots, right? How do you get the bump out in bumpers so you can beautify your actual streets. do you keep people from parking in the right of way where you could have planted a tree but now it's -- it's compacted? So that, again, Green Infrastructure Center would be online, iust talk to you and see what you need and they would provide suggestions. Now everything would be going through city council.

MS. TAYLOR: Absolutely.

MS. HUYLER: But they would provide you suggestions and those are yours to keep and work through and over. So ten years from now things change, always apply for another you can tree ordinance. Conway, North Myrtle Beach, they're pretty good on their ordinances. They too have a lot of development and they're trying to keep developers from coming in, clear cutting the land and then selling it. It is far most cost effective to preserve your trees than to plant them, because once things get developed, most of the time you can't squeeze a tree in. It's between tiny space between the street and

sidewalk, or it's a sidewalk cut out that's probably best for a palm tree, which is a palm and not a tree.

MS. HUYLER: Yeah. So -- so I wanted to talk that. And the other thing, again, if you want to be on the webinar in October, please send me your email and you will on it. It'll be statewide. You can ask questions and all οf that. Application process for all these grants will be in November. The application is not like a resume, it's a survey. It's basically a yes, what have you guys done with your city, have you had a tree canopy map, have you done an inventory. If it's no, no, no, no, no, you just say what you want and why. The more concise, the more specific you are, the best. If you can name businesses and organizations and non-profits that'll assist you with this or any of this, name them. They want people to be very specific. The other thing is, and I know I'm going long, is the Tree City. This is the Arbor Day Foundation. This application opens up September to the end of December. There are four standards: a public tree ordinance, a tree

board, spend two dollars per capita on tree
issues and Mayor David, you would be signing a
proclamation to schedule a day to be Arbor Day.
I can come back and speak with you on this. I
don't want to take up too much time on that,
but you'll get a metal sign. You might have
seen them in North Myrtle Beach, reflective
stickers, banners and all of that. So I can
help with the application, all of this, in the
end, is part of that just helping you know what
you need for Tree City. But I can come back
and talk to you on it.
