16		Mallett and some workers from the county school
17		district are putting together this particular
18		reading program The other item and I ask the
19		chief of police to come up and talk about our
20		preparation for the hurricane and answer any
21		questions in regards from the community and
22		residents around the Governor's decision to
23		declare a state of emergency for the state of
24		South Carolina.

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probably aware of the hurricane that's out there. And the Governor issuing a mandatory evacuation starting at noon tomorrow. And the police department is just going to give you an update on that. And what to expect and what's going to take place.

POLICE CHIEF: Thank you, Mayor. Good evening, Mayor and Council. Great to be back here. 2:30 p.m. today, the Governor of South Carolina issued a mandatory evacuation for the east coast of South Carolina. That will start tomorrow at 12 noon. Basically telling people that they need to go ahead and start leaving now heading inward and try to get away from the storm. Right now we predict the storm will hit Wilmington, North Carolina. The eye. But also the storm, right now we predict, is over 500 miles long. So, everyone we will get a good patch of wind and rain. We're looking right now at maybe a foot or 3 inches of rain that we will see from the storm. We're looking at Thursday into Friday when the storm will hit. Tomorrow we will know a whole lot more as the days get closer. Exactly what time it's going to hit. But, like I tell everybody, sometimes

it's better to be safe than sorry. I know a
lot of you all rode a lot of storms. But, we
can't take this storm light. Right now it's a
category 4 storm. So, that's winds of 130
miles per hour. 130 miles per hour (inaudible)
we're looking for once it gets to the
South Carolina/North Carolina line, that it's
going to be a 4. Then it gets on land we're
looking at it to be a 2. A 2 is still
dangerous. We're looking at South Carolina,
even though we're not getting hit by the eye
the winds, we're not getting all, but we'll
still get anywhere from 70 to 85 mile per hour
winds. So, we ask all residents to make sure
you secure all you stuff on your property.
Inside your house. If you feel like putting
boards up on the windows, make sure you do
that. Make sure when you leave make sure you
take clothes for at least a week out. Make
sure you got all your medications. Make sure
you got all your documents. Like your Social
Security card. Birth certificate. Anything.
If you take medicine, make sure you have a list
of all that. Just in case you need to restock
when you get out. Just remember when doing

sometimes the storm might be over, but you
might not be able to come right back in. All
depends on how much the damage is that we have
to assess before we let people start coming
back in. We got power lines down. If we got
a lot of flooding. Trees. So, remember that
North Myrtle Beach will be blocking roads off.
So, if you if you want to stay. I'll advise
you to leave. But if you want to stay, that's
your choice. But just remember when it comes
that all emergency personnel shut down, that
means if your house is on fire, that means if
you get robbed, if you need medical attention
all that ceases. Police not coming out
there. Fire department not coming out there.
Ambulance not coming out there. During the
storm, no emergency personnel will be out. So,
you basically will be on your own until
everything clears up. And no telling how long
that will be. So, we advise everybody to
leave. Especially the people that are on
medication and might need medical attention.
We advise those, the main ones to leave out.
Make sure you take everything you need. You
know, if you know anybody that needs help

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getting to a shelter, make sure to call the police station or get in touch with me or my officer Marquis Darden. We'll make sure to get you to the shelters. I passed out flyers basically giving just you some οf the information I'm going over now. Make sure you take -- stay tuned to the news. As things can change throughout -- well, until the storm gets I think that's just about it. here. Anything else?

COUNCILMAN EVANS: Chief, the the last time Myrtle Beach police department closed off Myrtle Beach, you had to -- I wanted to get back to Atlantic Beach, so I had to have some kind of identification showing that I was a resident here in order to get back. So, if you leave folks may need to being something so Myrtle North Myrtle Beach police will let you thought. They will turnaround everybody that didn't have something showing that they were from Atlantic Beach or North Myrtle Beach to keep out sight seers.

POLICE CHIEF: Yes, sir. Make sure you got your ID.

If your ID does not say Atlantic Beach, make sure you got some kind of documentation that

shows that you live in Atlantic Beach. If you
live here, you should have an ID that says
Atlantic Beach, South Carolina and where you
live. But just like the Councilman said, when
they close the roads off and they block them
off, they're not letting no body in but the
residents. You have to have some kind of proof
to show that you live here. Word of advise
also if you you plan to stay, if you go out to
the grocery store or you go down the road
somewhere else and they got a road block there,
you're not going to be able to come back in.
So, I'm letting you know that now. And that
can be as early as noon tomorrow. When they
shut the roads off and not let anybody else in,
then they going to have one lane all the
lanes are going to be going one way out. So if
you say, well, I'm staying but I gotta go to
the grocery store real quick. When you try to
come back in we might block you. And basically
there's nothing I can do about it. So, you
can't call me and say well, chief, I need to
get back into the town. I'm going to say to
you be frank with you, I can't help you.
Because it's an ordinance from the Governor.

That's way over over my head. So, make sure
you get your stuff. If you need to get stuff
tonight, tonight would probably be the best
time to go ahead and make sure you got
everything you need. When they reverse these
lanes and start to send everybody out, they're
not going to let no body else in. I haven't
gotten the lane reversal schedule yet, but I'm
pretty sure it's going to come out later on
tonight. Or maybe even in the morning. How
they're going do the lanes. I'm pretty sure 17
going to be going one way. I know 501 all
that's going to be going one way out for
everybody leaving Horry County. The best place
to go is West. If you don't know where to go,
go West as much as you can. Don't go up north
because they're going to get hit pretty bad.
Some all depends on how far South you go,
they're going to be hit some too. So, try to
go west as far as you can. My update, Columbia
right now, is booked up. If you ain't got a
room set, you might you might find one. But,
what I'm hearing, Columbia is booked. I've
been telling a lot of people to go to
Spartanburg, up that way. Clemson, up that way

to try to find room if they don't want to leave out of South Carolina. But, Florence, South Carolina is probably going to get hit pretty hard too. So, try to get as far in as you can.

Any other questions from anybody?

COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: I got a question for you. I'm sure that I'm just behind whatever you all are doing, but are you all to door to door telling these folks? Because ---

POLICE CHIEF: We're passing out flyer to everybody.

COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: To everybody?

POLICE CHIEF: To everybody, to let them know.

Red Cross has shelters. But, Red Cross does not take no pets. So, let them know that they got to find somewhere for their pets to go.

But they will not take any pets at Red Cross.

POLICE CHIEF: Okay.

COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: Yeah.

police CHIEF: At the bottom, I I put that if you
 got pets make sure you find out which shelter
 that will accept pets. That's also on the
 flyer that I'm passing around.

**COUNCILMAN EVANS:** Let me ask you this, do you know of a -- where the shelters are? Is the high

school going to be a shelter this time as well?
POLICE CHIEF: I'm pretty sure it is. They haven't
declared which what areas or schools are
going to be a shelter yet. I haven't gotten an
update yet. But, I'm looking any minute to see
when they'll designate the the shelters. I'm
pretty sure North Myrtle Beach High School is
going to be one. I think one of the middle
schools in North Myrtle Beach too was a shelter
last time. I know they had enough shelters in
Myrtle Beach, but this end out here, I don't
know what all shelters that are going to be
down this way. I know North Myrtle Beach and
maybe one of the middle schools in North Myrtle
Beach. But sooner that's why I tell a lot
of people, stay tuned. Keep watching the new
as much as you can. When they start putting
out what the shelters locations the
locations of the shelters, you can know exactly
where to get to. But, like I say, plan to be
gone for a weeks time if you leave. Because we
just don't know how much damage this storm will
bring. So, don't just pack for two days
expecting to come back in. Because even if you
got your ID it might be two day and we're not

letting no body in. And the only person that
will be coming through is law enforcement and
emergency personnel. So, just plan for the
worst, hope for the best. Any other questions?

MAYOR EVANS: Nope. Thank you.

POLICE CHIEF: Yes, sir.

MALE SPEAKER: I saw where Coastal (inaudible) will pick up elderly people and all that. Are they doing that here? Those people who don't have transportation.

police CHIEF: Yes. Our police department is also going to help as much as we can at this time. If you got medical equipment that you got to move along with it. We're going to make sure we're able to get in contact with the personnel that can help assist getting you transported. Whoever got like, the big tanks that -- certain things they got to move and we can't fit in police vehicles. We'll get in touch with the right personnel to get it right for them.

Now, you're going to have 5 million people on the road at one time.

You can't really predict exactly where it's going. That's why we wait for tomorrow morning, the storm could pick up speed. That's something we try to predict with storms, but we really really can't so ...

POLICE CHIEF: All right. Well, my plan is -- me and officer Darden, we're going to be at out this weekend. But at the same time we gotta make sure we get safe too. So, we're going to be out as long as we can. We going to be out right up before the storm hits. If we can. We're going to be out all weekend. Once the storm hits and we feel like it's starting to move away a little from us, we'll start trying to get out a little bit and try to start assessing the damage. Try to make sure people not moving or breaking into buildings, are

houses and stuff. So, we're going to be out.

We're going to be -- we're going to be running

-- we're not going to be too far from Atlantic

Beach. So, we'll be in and out as much as we

can. But, when the storm hits, I'm not going

to sit here and lie to you all, we're not going

to be out. Power will be out. That's just the

bad part about it. I don't -- I hope no body

is down there in the hurricane trying to break

in.

COUNCILMAN EVANS: They will.

MS. WILLIAMS: My next question is -- cause we have generators of course -- but, my next question is, once the storm hits, right? How soon, as a business owner would we get to return to make sure that all the power is up and going again (inaudible) we're not encoring a loss. About how soon?

POLICE CHIEF: As soon as we assess the damage.

Like I said, it can take anywhere from -- I'm going to be totally honest with you -- after the storm passes and when I say storm pass, the sun starts coming out. So, as soon as all the

rain and everything pass. We'll we'll have officers out and around. We'll have contractors out to try to see how much damage there is. See if it's safe to let people come in. We got thousands of power lines down and trees down (inaudible) we're not going to let you all come in ...

MAYOR EVANS: The Governor actually makes a statement as well. Just like he closes it down. He makes a statement to say when we can come back as well.

POLICE CHIEF: So, it it could take anywhere from a day to a couple days before we let anybody come back in.

MS. WILLIAMS: Okay.

Because last time I think -- like we didn't get hit that hard. But, everybody around us did. So, it kind of affected Atlantic Beach too. Because everybody around us had to go to Myrtle because to get here. So, you have to think about that too. How much damage -- even if Atlantic Beach doesn't get hard, what about everybody around us. Can you get on the roads and drive safe? So, it -- like I said, prepare

But, at 12 o'clock they're going to start but they're trying to get everybody out now. Because if Thursday everybody wants to leave Wednesday night. Now you got 500 people on the

road, trying to get out. So, basically you
have plenty of time. Anything else from

to carry out a lot of duties, which I know for
a fact probably is not in their roll or their
responsibilities. But, I want to give them
credit for doing that. Because it would be not
right to do so. And so, with that being said
even and still in speaking with them,
they're very innovative, creative. They're
all, you know, whenever the come around they're
talking about new ideas. New things that they

And it's been a pleasure speaking with him. with Meeting him. Just him getting neighborhood acclimated to the in general. Certain questions that I had when times course I couldn't -- if the office was closed, I couldn't get Mr. Q, I'd -- and I hope you don't mind me saying Mr. Q (inaudible) anyway. Certain times when I couldn't get with him or something like that. Then of course ---

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MS. WILLIAMS: --- of course, you know, I would speak with Mr. Mayor and he would answer to the best of his ability. And one thing I like about Mr. Mayor, Mr. Mayor doesn't -- he's not a person that proclaims he knows it all. don't know, he's going to seek the answer. Ιf I don't know this, I'm going to tell you. Ιf it's something that he knows, then he's going to be straight forth and honest. And one thing I've found about a good leader, a good leader is one who can admit their strengths and

weaknesses. And that's what I like about him.
Never to the point that it's going to delineate
the board or the town or anything or or devalue
you all. But, you know, he would answer to the
best of his abilities. Now, I I, you know, for
me, like I said form the outside looking in,
and I just have to be honest with you. I, you
know, said to Mr. Mayor, when we spoke twice,
you all seem so decisive. Like form the
outside looking in, I understand that when
people vote for you, they basically hire you.
That's that's what happens and they depend on
you. So, you know, and I said that to him
personally. For me looking at the town and
what has gone on, and there's no where, any
place that's perfect. So, the things that I
encountered, you know, since I've been here in
the three months and trying to figure out how
to get over it. Or what's next. I'm no
different than anyone else. You're going to
have complaints or you know, you're going to
try to figure out what's wrong. But,
nevertheless as I said to Mr. Mayor, when you
you when people vote for you, you're
basically hired. And then knowing that when

he's hired, his board, you know, he has a
Councilman or a board, that when it's
implemented and put in place and I'm not
really certain of the structure yet. But,
anyway, they're put in place. They're also
hired as well. And so, for me, you know,
you're accepting a position where you take an
oath. And and if you all take that oath, then
you at least owe the people the opportunity to
operate in the highest account level,
accountability possible. So, for me, you know,
just on the outside again, looking in, when I
hear the name Mayor. Even that you all have a
level of accountability, than even more is
expected from him than anyone else. Because
it's that title of Mayor. Even if that's not
how it's structured. So, for me, you know, I
kinda weighed in on him. You know, to say look
at the place next door to me. At one point,
yes, I was seeking to buy purchase that
property and, but it's not mine yet. Until it
becomes mine, or the people agree to okay,
we're at an agreement, we'll sell. Then
something should be done about the property
next door. Because it doesn't look good for

the restaurant. It's it's technically and
eyesore. So, and then on the opposite side,
you know, I understand that the person that's
on the opposite side of me, you know he can be
very stubborn. He has problems with the city
of North Myrtle Beach and everybody else. So,
when the city of North Myrtle Beach just
reached out to say that this is a problem, that
the lady with the business is having next door,
can we have right to go on your property, there
was problem with that. So, my thinking is
that, I just feel that there should be some
kind of outlet. Or I should be able to reach
back to someone. I did go to security and we
talked about it. Because of course he pays
taxes. And he's indebted to the town just like
anybody else. Because he owns property. And
he should be, you know well, I can't say
what he should be. But, there should be
something in place just participate with the
person next door. Which is here, like I said
a new business owner. I do plan to be a
resident as soon as my place is finished, but
at the same time, I am just trying to get the
right structure on how things actually operate

here. To be able to flow properly as a
business owner. And I don't know, Mr. Q maybe
you spoke with code enforcer. He did come by,
but at the end of the day, the code enforcer
never showed back up. He never did anything.
At the everything that has happened thus
far, we had to find a way to make it happen or
get it resolved ourselves. So, for me, my
standing here, is that if either it's Mayor
because like at the end of the day Mr.
Mayor, when your term is said and done, you
know, it's either going to be Mayor Jake Evans
did a great job. He did something good for the
town. Or it's going to be the opposite. Mayor
Jake Evans did nothing for the town, he sucked.
You know, we got more problems now than we had
then. So, it's what however you're trying
to write the certificate for your name at the
end of the day. And I know it's not just you
by yourself and you have people with you, the
only thing I'm asking for is is there some type
of formatted? Something that you can follow,
that's been put together, that if you're having
problems, how do you resolve your problems
without having to wait for weeks at time to get

motorcycle and was seeking drugs. What would
even make them think that drugs would be
located near the restaurant. So, again it's a
stigmatism on the town and he was an older
Caucasian guy, driving a nice Harley. So, you
know, it just it's certain things that's here,

that what are we going to do as people and a
body to help get rid of the stigmatism. And
then my question too is what is on the agenda
to like display or show unity of the effective
leadership in this town. Because for me, I I
and I ask that question because they officers
they did a back to school back to school
program with the children. And one, the only
person that I saw here was Mr. Mayor, which was
great. I have a lot of pictures of him with
different people. What really helped me to
even feel better about it, is when kids was
coming up to him him, yong. He had older
people, they asked to take pictures with him.
Some of the other ladies were like, oh, we
didn't know you was the Mayor. So, with that
being said, what is happening that people
why do they not recognize his face as the
Mayor? And he's the Mayor of Atlantic Beach.
Like what's what's falling off by the wayside
that no one knows that Jake is the Mayor? And
then even for the kids he has a big roll. You
know, a a big responsibility. I'm going to
keep honing on him on it, because he decided to
take that title. And when he took that title,

he decided to speak for the people. The people
that's behind the scenes. You all are speaking
for the people. It's not like, you know, the
people can walk off the street and and make
their own rules or laws. They got to come to
you all to make something happen. So, you
know, with that being said, that's my question
is, what is on the agenda to display, or or to
show effective leadership in the town without
it looking like it it's decisive. What does
the have planned along with you, Mr. Mayor, to
lay a foundation for growth? Like what is
happening next? I was listening to you all
battle back and forth about the the hometown
event that's coming up. I think that it should
be things in the community that everybody gets
together and and stick together and make it
happen together. Again, it goes back to the
officers, when they did the back to school
program. You know, what was what was the
marketing strategy? How did they let the
people know that the back to school program was
happening? Why didn't they have more support
at the back to school program? I only saw Mr.
Mayor, I didn't see anybody else. And then Mr.

Mayor spoke for Mr. Mike Long. And said, I,
you know, his accountability was he had surgery
or whatever and the reason why he told me that,
is because I was asking. Because me coming to
the back to school program and being sponsor of
it, I was expecting to meet and see more people
from the Council. Or just see everybody
working together, unified basically. So,
that's that's my question of laying the
foundation. And the officers again, I want to
say they did a great job. You know, I see that
it did a lot for the children that was here.
A lot of people left with happy hearts. That's
what we want to do. The kids are our future.
And then, I want ask another questions are, in
in asking the question of what's the plans to
lay a foundation for growth, I wanted to know
what are the experiences of everyone to provide
that particular growth for the town. Like,
what is it that you have? Ms. Gordon may say
I have 10 years under my belt as a school
teacher and I, you know, the ups and downs of
kids and this is the best way to do it. Or
this is the best way for our town to grow.
And, I'm just hypothetically speaking. And

then from there also, what are you all going to
do when it come to the beautification of the
town? Like, what happens with Atlantic Beach?
When will anything on it change? Because
coming into in and out the Atlantic Beach,
everything looks the same. You know, nothing.
Can a new sign be put up? Or, you know, when
will it ever be deemed historical? Why can't
it a sign we welcome you to the historical
town of Atlantic Beach. Because it is it is a
historical place. And we want to preserve
that. And I'm certain you all will want to do
that. And then my last question is, sometimes
people and again, I'm new. And I'm just
speaking from the observation of what I've
observed since I've been here. What would be
the how would you all basically reaffirm you
commitment to the community? Especially and
I'm just saying that we have people that come
in and out of the restaurant a lot we have
people who have so much negativity. Oh,
they're not going to do anything. Oh, yeah,
that's been said five years ago. It's been
three years and this was supposed to change.
This that's the negativity that we get,

right? So, my only thing is is what will you
all do to recommit to the people or show some
type of re-commitment to the community to get
the community involved. Because I know you
have as many events as many events as you
want, but then the community or the people must
believe in what you're doing as well. So, for
me, as a new business owner, you know, that's
my thought. Again, you know, I you are as
good as what your foundation. You know, what
can you do, what can you say. I've seen you do
things that the average person wouldn't do. I
don't know if Mr. Mayor told you all, he was
pushing somebody's truck in the middle of the
highway last week. But, what is showing
commitment. Like, you know, if you're having
a problem, I'm here. That's the title I wear.
I'm here to help. And, you know, and it's just
not only towards him. Because any of you all
could be his opposer (ph) one day and run.
But, the thing about it is, even if you are the
first thing that somebody is going to look and
say, well what did he do while he was on on
Council. What did she do while she was on
Council, to make me feel like I should go out

and vote for that person. So, that's just my question, that's where I stand. Again, thank you all for allowing me to be apart of Atlantic We are happy. We have no complaints. Beach. Not with you all. I mean, business is good, to be a new business. Business is good and we appreciate people who constantly patronize us even not inside Atlantic Beach. But even on the the outside of Atlantic Beach. So, I just thank you all for this moment and this time. Okay.

MAYOR EVANS: I want to thank you again for your contributions and your time that you put toward the back to school program that we had. And you heard us say we were trying to get our reunion in order. You gave us a hand on that. I'll being looking for you to give us hand with this as well, so, yeah you were pretty good. So, I mean, it's just good to see someone new come to town with some fresh ideas and someone who's as active -- active as you've been and I definitely appreciate you and look forward and looking forward to working with you. Orcontinuing working with you.

MS. WILLIAMS: Okay. And my last question is, I'm



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looking forward -- if I can get some answers to some of the questions as how the town plans to move forward. And forward is important to me as well. Like I said, if I can be a part of it, by all means. But, at least it tells me what direction we need to be in when it comes to marketing and business advertising and of course commercial monetary value for the time.

councilwoman isom: Okay. And I want to say
 something while -- well, I'm not going to say
 where I was -- when they had the back to school
 program, I was delegate for my church. So, I
 was at a church conference that week. So -- I
 think I told them that. I probably didn't tell
 you, but I told the police officer that I was
 I was at a church conference.

COUNCILWOMAN GORE: Okay. And I'm not trying to make no excuses, because we all need to be looked upon here and checked sometimes and stuff. And this is the first back to school program that I have participated in. When I wasn't in office, before I got elected, I

participated in the party. I was the Clerk of
Court here for 8 years and the kids was my
agenda. And that's who I worked with. I now
have a grandson that had an earache/ear
infection and the mom didn't know what to do.
So, therefore on the date that I was supposed
to be here with the back to school and work
with them that's why I wasn't in town. And,
I mean, like I said, I'm not by far not trying
to make any excuses. But when it comes down to
beautification for the town and stuff like
that. We are all working together on that now.
And it's like nothing that happened overnight.
And it's not going to happen overnight. We're
working on that. I mean, you have to start
somewhere. We started I started at the
cigarette butts that sometimes, you know, you
see little things and stuff that need to be
and so therefore it's just a work-in-progress,
that's all. And like I said, once again, I'm
going to keep saying I'm not trying to make no
excuses for myself. But, I have been into your
establishment more times than one and
with Crystal, I've met her whenever you all
first came down around Memorial weekend. And

4	that you have to knock on our door and get us
5	out of the house to get to it or whatever.
6	But, I mean, we're willing people. We're
7	willing to help you at any any time we can or
8	whatever. We're willing to do that. And
9	getting back to the kids and stuff, we have a
10	lot of things that's lined up for kids. We're
11	here though. It's kind of funny, we're a very
12	unique town and stuff like that. Because we
13	may have kids that's here today, that's gone
14	tomorrow. These we're in a transit place
15	here. Where last year, we had many more kids
16	than what we have now. A year before we had
17	less than what we have now. So, therefore,
18	it's like, you know, it's back and forth here.
19	Because like I said, it's transit. This is
20	where people a lot of people make it their
21	home. But a lot of people come here just to
22	get on their feet and they're out of here. So,
23	therefore it's it's not nothing hard to do. Or
24	something impossible to do. But, it's more
25	like something that you have to work on with

1	these people around here. Then you get I'm
2	very glad that that the constituents look at me
3	and they do. And one thing about me, my phone
4	number has never been off to none of them.
5	They can call me at any time. And they know
6	this. So, therefore I'm willing to work with
7	anybody at anytime. Any given time. I mean,
8	and I think they feel the same way too. You
9	know, sometimes you aren't where you want to be
10	at. But, when things come up, that's how it
11	happens. Because, like I said, with the back
12	to school program that's that's my joy. That's
13	my thing that I like being with the kids and
14	stuff like that. But like I said, something
15	came up, so I wasn't there. But I'm always on
16	time to help somebody if they need me. So,
17	therefore, you know, like I said, I I my heart
18	is in this town. I didn't run for the the
19	Council seat just to say that I have a
20	position. That's not why I did it. I did it
21	because my heart is here. I grew up here. I
22	grew up in this town and I raised my kids in
23	this town. So, therefore, like I said, it's
24	blatant right now and it looks bad or whatever.
25	But, believe me now, it looks better now then

it did two or three years ago. So, therefore,
yes. We're working on it. We just we just a
little smaller than what everybody else is.
But, we're working on it. So, therefore that's
all I want to say. But, like I said, I don't
feel like I owe anybody an excuse but where
I was at. But I'm just letting you know that
something came up, yeah. But, the kids is my

MS. WILLIAMS: --- and my thinking is is just that again, speaking with the patrons and I believe that the people's voice sounds louder than anything ---

COUNCILWOMAN GORE: Always.

MS. WILLIAMS: --- I don't mean to sound brass. So,
 my thinking is is just in the restaurant and
 just being as a business owner and nothing to
 -- like I said the value will delineate because
 it wouldn't make sense for me to allow
 negativity to hound or loom over the town and

1	be a business owner. But, at the same time I
2	listen. Because you build relationships with
3	people just listening. You got some people who
4	will be forthright. You got some people who's
5	in the wrong but just want to make an excuse.
6	So, my think is and that's the reason why I
7	asked the questions because, again I'm new.
8	I'm new. I feel like I'm from the outside
9	looking in. So, and from me being on the
10	outside looking in, this is what I see. And
11	so, that's what I'm basically speaking from.
12	And I'm glad you brought up the City Hall
13	situation. And maybe it's changed. But, Mr.
14	Q, I have a question. And my question is that
15	and this is just me, okay what I found
16	the problem is that, whenever you call to the
17	City Hall, or I call, you know, often at one
18	point, there was an answering machine that
19	comes on. And the thing about it is I'm not
20	for certain about whether it's changed.
21	Because I haven't called. I drive up there now
22	before I call. But, nevertheless, just from a
23	business perspective, and just from a point of
24	view of expense. You know, expenses. My
25	question is, why does an answering machine

answer that phone during business hours? As opposed to a voice that's more welcoming. And and again, it's just me. Somebody else might call and be okay with -- new people might be okay with hearing an answering machine. But, if call and someone says, thank you for calling the City of Atlantic Beach, this is such and such, how could I help you. You know, that's more warming and inviting. As opposed to, you have reached the City of Atlantic Beach, you you know, that kind of stuff. So, I quess my quest- -- well, not a guess. My question is to you, is that something that you all are going Is it going to change? to resolve? What is going to happen with that piece?

- MR. QUATTLEBAUM: We just, you know -- we had it upgraded the phone system.
- 18 MS. WILLIAMS: Okay.

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- MR. QUATTLEBAUM: We did that. We just upgraded our system. We're still going through the process of learning, you know high-tech.
- 22 MS. WILLIAMS: Uh-huh.
- MR. QUATTLEBAUM: In terms of calling the office,

  it's just a selection. We have two lines. One

  for the administrative office and one for the



police department. But there's only two choices you have to make.

MS. WILLIAMS: Okay.

- MR. QUATTLEBAUM: One side, you should get someone on the line. If you don't, it's because the system that's set up, the people are on the line and it automatically goes to voicemail.
- 8 MS. WILLIAMS: Understood.
- 9 MR. QUATTLEBAUM: So, you don't lose any calls.
- 10 | MS. WILLIAMS: Uh-huh.
  - MR. QUATTLEBAUM: So, we have only limited lines in terms of that. But, in the prior -- when you called previously, the problem was that our system was out outdated. Okay. In terms of that. It didn't have any capacity in order to pick up information or to even retain information.
- 18 MS. WILLIAMS: Gotcha.
  - MR. QUATTLEBAUM: We're working on correcting that.

    We got some bugs to get out in terms of the new systems. But, 9 times out of 10, you should get a direct person while office hours are one.

    And plus in terms of we just made another transition with staffing. We lost our former police clerk/court administrator --

administrative person. We lost her. We're breaking in a new person now. So, we've got some issues to deal with. That should get resolved in terms of it.

- MS. WILLIAMS: Okay. And I I have another question.

  I have another question. As far as the land that's that's up for sale at one point, is the city planning on bidding on that land?
- MR. QUATTLEBAUM: The city doesn't have it -- the funds to bid on that property.
- MS. WILLIAMS: Okay.

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- MR. QUATTLEBAUM: That's that's short or long bid as private property. It was up for sale. auction, it's a forced auction because the LLC is dissolving the court ordered auction. And based on the highest responsive bidder -- which they gotta low bid the first time. back out again and waiting now. Μy understanding, they do have an offer. I don't know what it is. I don't know who it is. the answer to your question, the town doesn't have the resources to compete. They wanted a minimum of 1.6 million dollars.
- 24 MS. WILLIAMS: Okav.
  - MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Right.

- MS. WILLIAMS: Right. Yeah. I get it. 1 2 understand what you're say. And I was asking that question just to see if it's a situation 3 4 where -- being that the town was in, you know, 5 in the red of everything, that perhaps it could 6 merge with a private entity, where by the town 7 could maybe seek funding. But -- federal 8 funding ---
  - MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Well, I'll be I'll be happy to talk with you and answer your question that you asked the Mayor initially, on the roll of the Council versus the administration ---

 formal report. Ask for me or sergeant to do a
 report. We will write it up for you. We we
 will give you a copy of it. So, when you get
 two or three copies, now you can go -- we tell
 you to go up to Myrtle Beach and and file a

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restraining order to keep him from coming around your property. When we get the reports, he's going to (inaudible) to the judge and let him make a decision. And then we'll have enough to issue a warrant for his arrest. For harassment and stalking.
