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8 MAYOR EVANS: There is no New Business. Town

Manager reports?

Mayor, Council, first and foremost MR. QUATTLEBAUM: I would like to thank the Mayor and Council, my staff and the residents of the Town for their condolences during the passing of my sister. I appreciate Council adapting the meeting to accommodate me. Thank you very much, all of the words and prayers that were sent my way. Just a couple items on the agenda. I'd like to bring your attention -- at our last meeting, if recall, there presentation, was а proposal, to put up a sign, digital sign, the location where our current Town sign is on 30th Avenue by Incite Digital. I had the proposal reviewed by our attorney. There were some legal issues that came up under the legal

review that we're trying to work through and

modify. The proposal for the site but we're
still negotiating with the proposed owner, Mr.
Kirk can't think of his last name. Kirk
Kirkland. Name just came to me. But we're
still talking so it's a possibility that we
should we come to an agreement and, if we
do, I'll have something to at the March 1st
meeting. Just for informational purposes, the
after-school program that was formerly here in
the fall has been moved to the church on 29th
Avenue. They accommodated the program and
they're still pushing to get and recruit
students from the Town to participate in the
after-school program. I think it's still on
Wednesdays at 3:00 o'clock. I invited the head
of the program to come make a presentation at
this meeting. Her schedule would not permit.
She will be coming to the March 1st meeting.
We are actively recruiting and trying to get
the word out to the community that that program
is still ongoing at the what's the name of

COUNCILWOMAN ISOM: (Inaudible) First Baptist ---

Avenue. That is all I have, Mayor and Council.

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MAYOR EVANS: We're down to Public Time. I've got one card here that belongs to Mr. Sketers.

MR. Yes, sir. all, SKETERS: First οf Mr. Quattlebaum, we're sorry to hear about loss of your family member and (inaudible). just a question -- couple of questions that -- I'm not asking for -- to entertain (inaudible) or anything. I just want to know about ... It's my understanding -- I haven't seen anything in writing due to that, that the Council gave themselves a raise some time ago. That -- that is my first question, and I would like to try to understand a little bit better how they merited, or what caused Council to give themselves another roll -- a raise. another raise -- I'm sorry. And that I don't exactly how -- our financial situation know here in Atlantic Beach, but I think at this point all of our resources, as far as monies, can be used. And I'm not saying it wasn't merited. And another thing I would like to have an answer to, when is the last time that the employees οf Atlantic Beach had an

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CLERK:

Uh-huh.

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MR. QUATTLEBAUM: --- public ordinances were presented to the public on the issue of increasing the salaries for the Council. I think it was September and October.

CLERK: Uh-huh.

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MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Okay. Prior to the election. And the rational was doing it because they didn't know who was going to win the election, whether it was gonna benefit either the incumbents or anyone new coming in. And they wanted to do it before that and not do it after the fact terms of -- because whoever won the election. So it was presented prior to the election and all of the candidates had eligibility to run, and the raise would take affect January of 2020. Okay? So that's the time sequence in terms οf how it was presented the (inaudible) two public meetings. I don't know if you're aware of it. You don't recall them having public meetings?

MR. SKETERS: To the extent?

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: For the increases.

23 MR. SKETERS: For the public (ph)?

24 MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Yeah, two public meetings,

September and October. They were public

MR. SKETERS: I understand that you did (inaudible)

a lot of -- most the time, when you're in an organization and they're supposed to get a raise, they say well, we brought (inaudible)

Atlantic Beach. We had a -- what I call good (ph) business and brought into Atlantic Beach that increased the revenue \$500,000, you know, things that (inaudible) supposed to see.

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Mr. Sketers ---

MR. SKETERS: Sketers.

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MR. QUATTLEBAUM: We do do that. Okay, we start -we go through the budgetary process prior to the adoption of the budget where we go in terms of line by line, in terms of categories, and then public hearings on my recommendations to Council. That is done. Personnel matters and discussion of personnel is done in Executive Session for confidential reasons to protect the staff members in terms οf their confidentiality. So it's not publicly known in terms of the rating of what they did not make public to the public because there are personnel laws that govern it. So -- but in terms of any increases is adopted in the budget and presented to Council starting in April, and

we will have the same hearing process again in terms of going through each department expenditures and income for the time. All right?

MR. SKETERS: Yes.

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(Inaudible background noise.)

MR. QUATTLEBAUM: I can't speak to in terms of the decision of Council. I don't have the -- that's the Council's part in it. I just gave you the sequence of when it was approved. All right?

(Inaudible background noise.)

COUNCILWOMAN WILLIAMS: If you don't mind, I wanted to interject. When we attended South Municipal Association οf Carolina's conference, when they spoke about the now -now, in this era and time, that the typical pay per municipality for council people was \$500 --\$400 and \$500. And when they discussed it in the area that I was in, in the training area, they had the gentlemen of Rock Hill and couple other places that were speaking about the municipality and the governing part of it and the financial, you know, what they're doing financially now. I'm just saying that because

MAYOR EVANS: And the other thing, I think, when you

sat on Town Council and I think that was
we're going way back to say 20 years. You,
yourself know there hadn't been an increase
with what Council members get and what the
Mayor gets in probably 20, 25 years. I kind of
researched that as well. I mean it was long
overdue and it's definitely deserving, and I
mean we're looking at the municipal association
laws and looking at what other cities and towns
are getting as well. And of course, we know
we're a small municipality and we're don't
want to try to give ourselves as much as these
large cities get because they we could
probably say yeah, they have a lot more action
and a lot more to do. But when you're talking
city governments in Myrtle Beach and North
Myrtle Beach and what they're getting, what
we're getting is probably not even a drop in
the bucket. So, it is fair and then like as he
said as well, this is not something that we
have done for ourselves. We've done this back
before this administration took place without
knowing who was gonna be here at this table
because we felt that whoever was up here
deserved it.

MAYOR EVANS: All right. Thank you.

COUNCILWOMAN WILLIAMS: I'm sorry.

MAYOR EVANS: Go ahead.

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COUNCILWOMAN WILLIAMS: Not to even something good that you just said. And you all don't want me going there. When you said that a lot of people don't realize the work that we do, that's why it's good to find some loyal citizens that we have the Town heart at it's best interest and not going to be the ones that -- who a lot of the times we have problems in small town because it'll be the ones this that's inside to take stuff to the outside that cause media and all these other people always want to come in. And instead of working together as a unified body -- just like you said, there's a lot of things that we do that the people don't know. That's why really need some good ambassadors for the Town,

for the city, that would say, for instance, you
may see someone that really don't understand
what's going on and question about it.
Hypothetically speaking I'm just
hypothetically speaking you, Ms. Isom, the
(inaudible) gentleman that's here, if there was
if we had good ambassadors, they could be
like oh no, you know, it's not that the city's
not doing theirs or it's not that just Mr. Q or
the Mayor, or one of the next, is not doing
this. Just let me kind of explain to you where
we are right now because when the ambassadors
understand what's going on, then they can help
implement it in the Town, and then the Town can
grow more, be more unified, and understand
what's really happening, you know, overall is
what I'm saying because just like you said,
there's a lot of things that happen that a lot
of people don't know about. But if we had, you
know, good ambassadors or, you know, someone to
work closer with us and help it grow properly,
then that would be a benefit.

MR. SKETERS: And let me just ask this question.

You will see the need sometimes for our -
(inaudible) citizen, sort of like an oversight

COUNCILWOMAN WILLIAMS: You said an oversight?

Repeat that. Repeat it, repeat it.

MR. SKETERS: Do you said a need for an oversight committee? I don't know everything and you all don't know everything, but if our efforts -- combine our efforts together, we can do a lot of things that are probably unmanageable.

MAYOR EVANS: I mean that would be nice if we had enough citizens interested in doing that because, I mean, just to piggyback a little bit on what she's saying is that you don't have to sitting to this table, be а mayor Councilperson, to bring something to the table And help the Council out. find and wesometimes being more argumentative about what the Mayor and Council are doing rather than actually -- and I'm not saying you rather than just bringing things to the table that can help. We welcome ideas from, you know, the citizens of the Town of Atlantic Beach, and we gladly, you know, prefer that. You know, if that's something that you've got or an idea that you think would work, we want

 That's something we've talked about and that's
 -- we are actually working on.

- MAYOR EVANS: Well, I mean not as far as actually
 even installing a person or a historian, I mean
 the historic Town of Atlantic Beach, we all
 know it's a historic town and we're working on
 getting the recognition that we should get from
 being one of the historic towns in the State of
 South Carolina.
- MR. SKETERS: I understand the historic town. A person to represent as a historian the Town of Atlantic Beach ---
- MAYOR EVANS: Well, if the majority of this Council sees fit to hire a particular person for a historian, we would definitely do that when we get to that point. But right now, we're just

working on actually establishing ourself in the

State of South Carolina and being recognized in

the State of South Carolina as a historic town.

We have -- we've got to -- we're taking baby

steps here. We want to handle that first.

MR. SKETERS: Let me get something -- you say hire a
 historian?

MAYOR EVANS: No.

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MR. SKETERS: A historian is usually a volunteer person.

MAYOR EVANS: No. I didn't say anything about hiring -- I said -- I didn't say anything about a person at all. I said we're working as Mayor and Council, working ---

MR. SKETERS: I ---

MAYOR EVANS: --- with the State. No, not to hire anybody. To be recognized as a historic town in the Town of Atlantic Beach, we're working with the State of South Carolina and highin the State ranking officials οf South Carolina to actually -- to consult and help us get the recognition we deserve as being historic town. And we've been courteous to you You're supposed to get three minutes. You got ten. How about that?
