 -- proposed budget. I believe -- to ask what
 is the status of street signs and what category
 does that fall into on the General Budget?

The ones I was telling you about that there's

Atlantic Beach is experiencing a reduction in

its projected income and expenses, i.e.,
business license collection fees, property
taxes. The hospitality taxes fees, that is
held up in litigation. So it has had an
adverse affect on all municipalities, and our
town in particular also. Councilwoman Gore
raised the issue, and it was something we were
prepared to address in terms of having
additional street signs put up. But since
March when COVID hit, we have frozen all
expenditures to conserve until we know fully
what our projected income and expenses. So to
answer your question in terms of that, we were
about to pursue getting cost estimates to have
those signs put up but had to put it on hold
until we know better what our economic
situation will be. I'm proposing to Council in
this budget that we adopt our same level of
expenditures and income levels, even though we
know that they're going to be substantially
reduced, and that we amend our budget in the
month of August to better project what kind of
resources we'll have come in. So that's a long
answer to say but the signs are on the
radar. In terms of the cost, I just at this

particular time, I cannot say definitively when we will have the resources to have them put up. Once we're at the end of our fiscal year, June 30th, we are in the process of collecting business license renewal fees and based on that income we will have a better idea in terms of resource availability. But it's something that we acknowledge that needs to happen and to be -- at this time -- I just can't at this time give you a definitive time frame on when we can address it.

- MS. DIVINE: Okay. But we do have quotes or, you know, when we get the budget back in line, we'll be able to move forward on those?

 and maintenance. They're not a major capital

item so routine repairs and maintenance. And the cost -- I don't anticipate -- I don't have any numbers. We were just going out to get some quotes on what it would be. We had made an assessment of the number of streets that needed signs, but I don't think it's gonna be substantial but I just can't give you a definitive number at this point.

years ago, had started putting money in escrow
from Town receipts of electrical utility
payments to bury the lines underground. It was
about five years ago. And I think
approximately three years ago two or three
years ago, Santee Cooper decided, based on the
cost, to abandon the program of doing the of
taking the power lines and burying them
underground. And it was paid to the Town at
that time, the escrow money that was being
reserved to have the underground lines done.
Currently now, as you may be aware, in terms of
the question of finances for Santee Cooper,
they thought about potentially it being taken
over by another electrical company, all of
their company here at this point. But two
years ago, Santee Cooper abandoned the program
that they were going to build put the lines
underground. I have not heard of any new plans
or proposals to enact or reenact that program,
but I can look into it, see if there's any
plans in the articles.

MS. ALLEN: Thank you. But -- so, I -- I could be wrong about this, but I was pretty sure that

they did proceed on either side of Atlantic
Beach with the burying of the lines. Do you
know why they abandoned it with Atlantic Beach?
MR. QUATTLEBAUM: Well, the I don't know, you
know, whether they did nor not on in North
Myrtle Beach. I'm not aware of that. But what
we were told the Town was told based on the

8	and I'm noticed last year we had security
9	officers who were stationed outside to help,
10	you know, ensure public safety because the
11	other night, I woke up to a barrage of
12	gunshots. And, you know, gunshots don't have
13	names on the bullets so, you know, I'm very
14	concerned about our public safety as a town.
15	And as we grow, I would like to see, you know,
16	just to ensure that whatever we do I'm not
17	something has to be shut down or nothing, but
18	we're gonna have to ensure that we can
19	ensure that we have public safety. So
20	COUNCILWOMAN GORE: I would like to chime on his
21	remark right there (inaudible). And I'm very
22	sorry that you went through that and, of
23	course, nobody else wants to have to live that
24	nightmare right here, but at the same time, it

happened over on the corner of Sea View and

30th, and the club was from my understanding
I wasn't there, but from my understanding,
the club was open, and it didn't happen in the
club. And that club was not the only business
that was open in town, which it could have
happened on 30th anywhere, even in the club at
the bar. I think that our biggest thing is
'cause the police did a fine job with it, but
when you bring these folks out of the country
to the club, or wherever they may come from, we
cannot so much control what they have in their
cars. Now, the club over there I manage
that club over there, and I can assure you that
nobody had a gun in that club because they're
checked before they go in the club. But at the
same time, that's just something that happened
the other night and, for the record, it did not
happen in the club as it's stated in the
newspaper and on the television. It happened
over on Sea View, and that's where the shooting
and like I said, once again, I apologize,
'cause I am the manager down there, the daytime
manager. I'm not there at night. I'm the
daytime manager. But from my understanding, it
didn't happen in the club.

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POLICE CHIEF ROBINSON: Yes, I'm on the line. We're doing everything we can. We're working with Horry County. We're trying to get these people off the streets that feel like they can come into our town and cause chaos so that's one of the things that we're really working hard to make sure this town stays safe. Some of the things that we're doing, we're trying to find out when more people will be in town to try to up our manpower during those times, those hours that the club'll be open or just people in the town here. But we're doing everything to make sure that the citizens of the Town are safe at all times. We don't want no kind of acts of violence in the town. It don't matter if they're down there аt the club if or at somebody's apartment, you know ---

COUNCILWOMAN WILLIAMS: Right.

POLICE CHIEF ROBINSON: --- we're real strong about
 it. So, we're doing everything we can. Like
 I said, we're working with SLED. We're working
 with Horry County and seeing what all we can do



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to make sure the citizens of the town are safe. We are a smaller department, we don't have 24-hour security so, you know, if there's something that we've gotta help -- have outside agencies help us with to make sure that we can keep safety here 24/7.

One of the things that we're going to implement, and we probably have to talk with the Council and the Town Manager, that the clubs can hire off-duty officers to patrol the parking lot, and they would just be assigned to the parking lot during -- when they have big crowds. They wouldn't answer no other calls, all they would do is just be out there in the parking lot so if some (inaudible) they have the authority to make arrests and, by officers being out there, nine out of ten, they won't act up but, like we're seeing at other places, police right down the street and people still do stuff. So that's something that we're

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implementing and something that we're talking with SLED or Horry County, and that's something that we'll be talking with the Council and the Town Manager about letting some of my guys that are not scheduled to work, they will come out on the night and help with the club -- not inside the club, but outside, patrol the parking lot. The cost would be up to the club owner. It will fall back on the club owner 'cause it wouldn't cost (inaudible).

COUNCILWOMAN GORE: Okay. I do want to take this I am the manager down there so part, Quentin. therefore, like I said before, now, somebody came in that we're supposed to actually spoke to Mr. Curry and I would like to (inaudible) to that effect or get with you so he can know what it is that he can do, and what can't do because this would be for the outside. But for the security guards that we had hired from the (inaudible) and I'm sure Ι want to say that can't they -you (inaudible) but at the same time, we're trying to do everything by the book and by the record down there.
